
GBC graduates first Bachelor of Science in Nursing Students

ELKO - Nearly two years ago, a group of motivated registered nurses met for the first time as part of their orientation to Great Basin College's budding Bachelor of Science in Nursing Program. Four of those of students, who began the degree program in January, 2005, were awarded a Bachelors of Science in Nursing during a graduation ceremony held at Great Basin College on Saturday, Jan. 6. Peggy Drussel, Paula Green, Diana Stundze and Starla Ricks were the first to complete requirements for the one of GBC's innovative baccalaureate degree programs. Dorothy Gallagher, Regent for the Nevada System of Higher Education, spoke during the ceremony and oversaw the conferral of the degrees.

"Two years ago I described the first group of BSN students as pioneers" said BSN Program Director Dr. Margaret Puccinelli. "GBC's Bachelor of Science in Nursing Program is a wonderful addition to our long-standing, highly successful Associate of Applied Science Degree in Nursing Program," according to Dr. Puccinelli. "Many of our associate degree nursing students have taken or are in the process of taking BSN required general education courses and several are already planning on beginning their upper division nursing coursework as soon as they graduate from the associate degree program and successfully pass the national licensing examination for registered nurses. We currently have 13 registered nurses in the process of completing BSN Program course requirements and they are doing this while they work fulltime. We plan on graduating another individual this spring and possibly four this time next year. Most of our nursing courses and many of the non-nursing courses are offered via the web so this makes our program very achievable.

Registered nurses can even begin working on their bachelor's degree by taking two courses this upcoming spring semester in advance of program admission this fall."

GBC's Bachelor of Science in Nursing Program was recently surveyed by the National League for Nursing Accreditation Commission, Inc. and was recommended by the survey team for the maximum five year accreditation status. 



Art teacher is ever the student

Well traveled Ben Parks to graduate with his third college degree

ELKO — Tuscarora resident Ben Parks, 47, has followed what some refer to as a non-traditional career path.

After graduating with a

Bachelor's in Economics from Stanford University in 1982, Parks worked as a carpenter in Seattle. He graduated with a Master's in Fine Arts in 1990 from Claremont Graduate University in California and taught for a short time at the University of Nevada at Reno. Since then, he has worked as a potter, run the Tuscarora Summer Pottery School and taught beginning and intermediate pottery at Great Basin College. Now, after four years as a part-time student at GBC, Parks is graduating today with an associate of applied science in nursing, and planning a career in the field.

"It feels like a real adventure,"
Parks said. "It does feel like
pushing my own envelope. I'm doing
something I really never thought I
would."

Parks said there were many factors in his decision to study toward a third degree at GBC. He saught an outlet to help other people that he wasn't getting from art. Teaching at GBC made it convenient and affordable for Parks to take nursing classes there. Moreover, nursing was a more practical career financially for him than art.

"What attracted me to nursing is the idea of service to people and not just doing your own thing," Parks said.

As a final reason, he divorced his wife in 2003, and said he needed to get his mind focused on something else.

Parks said he expects nursing will leave him some time to continue his art. Nursing shifts sometimes run in 12-hour shifts three days a week.

"I don't feel I'm giving up art for nursing, I just think I will be integrating the two," Parks said. "I'll have the solitude and self time with art but then have the part where I am out there helping people too."

He said he will continue running the pottery school, although he may have to manage his time there differently.

In a few years, Parks said he may continue his nursing education and go on to become a psychiatric nurse practitioner. Because he already has a bachelor's degree, he said he could go on to be a practitioner without going through another bachelor's program.

"I'm going to kind of take it as it comes and see where it leads," Parks said.

While he is excited, he conceded that there are some practical things that will take time to get used to.

"Tve spent so much of my life where I am the person that controls my time," Parks said. "Now I'm going to be working on someone else's schedule for most of my days. I'm a wage laborer for the first time in a long time."

He said the program at GBC has given him a great foundation. The training includes clinical rotations and a 90-hour preceptorship, where he worked with a nurse.

"I really did have a good experience where I felt like I was really helping people," Parks said. "That feels really good. Really rewarding."

Parks likes staying busy. He has a daughter and wants to stay in the community where he is rooted.

"It feels like a good, healthy stretch," Parks said of nursing.

Participants listened to music provided by Deborah Foley and Kevin Darveaux from Blue Feather Music as they perused the more than 100 silent auction items on display.


According to Friends of the Library Interim President Carol Fertig, the wide variety of silent auction items were donated by local merchants and community members.

GBC sets student fiscal aid session

Students squirming over applications for financial aid can find relief Jan. 28 at an informative seminar called College Goal Sunday.

The Great Basin College campuses (Elko, Ely, Pahrump and Winnemucca) will hold a seminar to help students complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) and to help advise them on ways they can afford college. Current college students and high school seniors are encouraged to attend.

The event begins at 2 p.m. in the High Tech Center on the Elko campus, the Ely Center on Bobcat Drive, the Pahrump Valley Center on Calvada Boulevard, and the Winnemucca Center on Kluncy Canyon Road.

"The FAFSA is a tough form to fill out," said Scott Nielsen, GBC's student fi-nancial services director. "We hope to lower the anxiety level."

The FAFSA is a mandatory step in securing financial aid, Nielsen said. The federal government uses the application to determine students' and their parents' expected contribution and how much money they are eligible to receive toward their education. Financial aid can come in the form of need-based grants and federally backed student loans.

Volunteers from the colleges' student services and academic affairs offices will be available to walk students and their parents through the forms. Lynn Mahlberg, GBC's vice president for student services, said the seminar will also connect students with the financial aid officers they'll be work-

ing with.
"It's a great opportunity for students and parents to meet financial aid officers and begin financial planning. It's a good example of the kind of service a Great

Basin College can provide to the community," she said. College Goal Sunday is

based on a program es-tablished by the Lumina Foundation for Education, a private foundation based in Indianapolis. It has been successfully implemented in Indiana, Arizona and now Nevada to help improve access to higher education. The state of Nevada applied for and received a \$170,000 grant from the Lumina Foundation to host College Goal Sundays for the next three years, always either right before or after the Super Bowl.

GBC's Mahiberg and Jeanne Rosenthal, GBC's grants coordinator, led the effort in Nevada. Mahiberg said students should apply for a personal identification number to fill out the FAFSA application online in advance by visiting www.pin.ed.gov, but students can also fill out a paper application at the

GBC nursing program accredited

Great Basin College's baccalaureate degree nursing program was granted initial accreditation by the Board of Commissioners for the National League for Nursing Accrediting Commission Inc., according to Dr. Margaret Puccinelli, Great Basin College's director of nursing.

According to the Commission, as a result of being accredited by NLNAC, Great Basin College and its nursing faculty have demonstrated their commitment to the highest standards of nursing education.

Great Basin College's associate of applied science degree nursing program is also accredited by the National League for Nursing Accrediting Commission. Both programs are scheduled for their next accreditation visit in the fall of 2011.

The NLNAC's accredita-

tion visit was the last step in the process that affirms the BSN Program's full accreditation status. During the three day visit, evaluators met with approximately 40 individuals from the college and community including registered nurses currently enrolled in the program.

"The site visit was very successful," said Puccinelli. "The evaluators recommended initial accreditation of our BSN Program for the maximum of 5 years based on the program's compliance with all accreditation standards. I couldn't be more pleased with this very favorable outcome."

The evaluator report with the full accreditation recommendation was presented to the NLNAC Commission for approval during their board meeting earlier this year. GBC's Associate of Applied Science in Nursing Program hosted a similar accredita-

tion visit in 2003 and was approved for continuing accreditation until 2011,

"GBC's Bachelor of Science in Nursing Program is a wonderful addition to our allied health science programs," said Puccinelli. "Many of our associate degree nursing students have taken or are in the process of taking BSN required general education courses and several are already planning on beginning their upper division nursing coursework as soon as they graduate from the associate degree program and successfully pass the national licensing examination for registered nurses."

GBC currently has over a dozen registered nurses in the process of completing BSN Program course requirements. Most of those students are working fulltime in health care in rural

Nevada.

College is earning its own ID

While administrators applauded the improvements after the Pahrump Valley Center shifted from the Community College of Southern Nevada system to Great Basin College last summer, the close proximity of Pahrump Valley High School doesn't make it seem like a real college campus.

The 30,000-square-foot building was completed in time for the fall 2001 school semester. Advocates for a new community college on the southeast part of the valley, east of Highway 160 near Manse Road, made a pitch to the state legislature last week.

"We need more classrooms and more facilities in the morning," Carina Kalleja, a nursing student at the Palrump Valley Center, said. She said most of the classes scheduled in the evening are convenient for working people, but not necessarily

"I don't like the fact that I'm going to have to go to my last class at seven at night and get out at 9:45," she said.

Kalleja echoed the sentiments of a friend sitting nearby, who said, "Oh, yeah, get the high schoolers out of here. It's more of a high school than a community college."

Pahrump Valley High School, just behind the center, had 392 students enrolled in the dual-credit courses at the Pahrump Valley Center, offering students the chance earn college credits at the same time as they take high school classes. Sixty-six high school students were taking a full load of 12 college credits under the program.

Last fall the count of high school students in dual-credit classes at the Pahrump Valley Center was 418.

By comparison, the duplicated head count for strictly college students dropped from 731 to 521 from fall 2005 to spring 2006, then rose sharply to 936 last fall and 974 this spring after the Great Basin College takeover.

The full-time equivalent was 157 college students in fall 2005, dropping to 112 last spring, then increasing to 188 last fall and 190 this spring.

Al Daniels, who took over as site administrator of the Pahrump Valley Center following the death of Kelcy Thompson in January 2006, said there's been a number of changes with the conversion to the Great Basin College system based in Elko.

"One of the biggest boosts that hasn't been accepted with open arms by Pahrump students is the interactive video. We have five interactive video stations and we're going to add one more," Daniels said.

The interactive video allows even just a few students sitting in a classroom in Pahrump to watch instructors beamed from Elko. The only problem is a limit on the bandwidth, Daniels said. The interactive video allowed the Pahrump Valley Center to expand its offerings from 80 sections per semester to 140 sections, he said.

Eight months before

Thompson's death, CCSN had frozen her account, taken away her signature authority and she wasn't able to market the center, Daniels said.

"The biggest amount of our enrollment, other than the dual credit, is in the evening. Part of that is people work. That's just a customary part of a community college. Adults can't get off in the day if they're employed, and a lot of people who take these classes are people who work in Las Vegas and live out here," Daniels said.

A major bone of contention with CCSN is the unfinished biology lab, Daniels said. That was needed for the prerequisite classes for the nursing programs to meet the needs of the new Desert View Regional Medical Center, he said — one of the more popular of five bachelor's degree programs now offered at the Pahrump center.

When students enrolled in the certified nursing assistant program finish that program, the college will start a registered nurse program in the fall, Daniels said. Nursing students complete their clinical work in areas like phlebotomy and radiology at the hospital itself, he said.

"If you do your training in the community, your chances of keeping (students) in the community increase tremendously," Daniels said. "That's what my mission is: to make that commitment we didn't make five years ago, which I always felt guilty about and felt it was an absolute crime against Pahrump."

Elementary education is another popular four-year program, Daniels said. There's a plan to offer a four-year degree in secondary education as well. Students may also complete their entire four-year college career in Pahrump for social work, or receive a bachelor's degree in applied science or a degree in integrative and professional studies.

The teacher situation seems to be improving with the influx of retired people to Pahrump, Daniels said. He said there are 35 adjunct instructors and two full-time instructors, one in English and another in biology.

and another in biology.

"This full-time biology instructor is huge. I think

the next one they're going to bring down is math and possibly follow that with history," Daniels said.

The addition of modular buildings at the high school reduced the number of class-rooms being used for dual credit at the Pahrump Valley Center, Daniels said. Five out of the 16, instead of 10, are used for high school classes. High school students take up three classrooms, a science room and two computer labs.

While some college students may not like to share space with their high school counterparts, Daniels said he's proud of the fact the dual-credit program at Pahrump Valley High School has been recognized both by the chancellor of higher education and the state legislature as a model program between a school district and a college.

Two high school seniors will actually complete their two-year college associate degree programs at the same time they receive their diplomas this spring, he said.


But Daniels referred to the rapidly rising 9.7 percent annual enrollment increases at Pahrump Valley High School when he added, "To be honest, the high school needs this center. We need to give them every room we got to alleviate the overcrowding."

Some college students at the Pahrump Valley Center were grateful to have a college campus in town, period.

"It's good for Pahrump," said Vanessa Mitchell, who's taking four courses including English, math, sociology and history. "It's nice to have something here you don't have to go to Vegas for."

Cory Thomas, however, said it's nothing like the community college he attended in Kansas. He will have two and a half years left to receive his degree in broadcast journalism after he transfers to the University of Nevada, Reno.

"They had more classes, they had places where they'd like help you out with living and the class schedules, they had times from in the morning all the way until late at night," Thomas said.



ELKO — The Great Basin College Nursing Program will hold training sessions for students interested in becoming a Certified Nursing Assistant (CNA). The course will be offered in a "compressed" schedule, Mondays through Thursdays, Oct. 9 through Oct. 24, from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. each day.

NURS 130, "Nursing Assistant," (registration call number 13973) will be taught by Norma Cozby, RN. The four-credit course qualifies the successful student for the Nevada CNA licensing examination. Students must provide evidence of a negative TB skin test or negative chest x-ray and have a current CPR certification. CPR certification is available through the Elko chapter of the American Red Cross.

The Nursing Assistant course provides

students with the classroom, laboratory and clinical experience to make them eligible to take to the State Certified Nursing Assistant Examination. A CNA licensee qualifies for an entry-level position in the health-care industry. It also opens the door to further study and advancement in health care. 



GBC nursing program gains accreditation

ELKO - Great Basin College Director of Nursing, Dr. Margaret Puccinelli, recently announced GBC's baccalaureate degree nursing program was granted initial accreditation by the **Board of Commissioners** for the National League for Nursing Accrediting Commission, Inc.

The commission, and its predecessor, the National League for Nursing, have stood for standards of excellence for all types of nursing education for more than 50 years.

According to the commission, Great Basin College and its nursing faculty have demonstrated strong commitment to the highest standards of nursing education.

Great Basin College's associate of applied science degree nursing program is accredited by the National League for Nursing Accrediting Commission. Both programs are scheduled for their next accreditation visit in the fall of 2011.

The accreditation visit was the last step in the process that affirms the BSN program's full accreditation status. During the three-day visit, 753-2102.

evaluators met with approximately 40 individuals from the college and community, including registered nurses currently enrolled in the program.

The evaluator report, with the full accreditation recommendation, was presented to the commission for approval during a board meeting earlier this year. GBC's associate of applied science in nursing program hosted a similar accreditation visit in 2003 and was approved for continuing accreditation until

GBC has more than a dozen registered nurses in the process of completing BSN program course requirements. Most are working full-time in health care in rural Nevada.

The program graduated its first students at the end of the 2006 fall semester, and will graduate others next month and again after this year's fall semester. Most of the BSN nursing courses and many of the non-nursing courses are offered via the Web, making access to the BSN degree convenient for working professionals.

with the skills training. They get the wildland firefighting experience as well as the putting the college credits to it.'

Murphy said the classes are beneficial both to students interested in a career in firefighting and to longtime firefighters hoping to advance their careers with a degree.

There will be 15 classes offered for the program, Murphy said. One class will include training on how to use pumps correctly and draw from a stream. Pumps and chainsaws will be available for the classes.

Other classes will focus on engine operation, with training to be a bulldozer boss or run a fire engine. Murphy said GBC doesn't currently own a fire engine or bulldozer. However, he expects the school will be able to work out agreements with local firefighting agencies to train with their equipment.

"I'm sure we will be able to come up with the things we need," Murphy said.

There will also be a basic wildland firefighting class, where students learn to fight fire on a hand crew; a fire behavior class; a first responder class; a backfiring class and others.

Murphy said some instructors for the class have already been selected. including Dylan Rader of the BLM's Elko Field Office.

There was no special funding or grants secured for the program, Murphy said.

"We are just going to get it started," Murphy said. "It is in cooperation with the local agencies. We are going to be relying on them as well."

Darfur genocide tops list

WASHINGTON (AP) — The ongoing genocide in Sudan's troubled Darfur region was the world's worst human rights abuse last year, the United States said today in a global report that found freedoms eroding in numerous other nations, including war-torn Afghanistan and Iraq.

In its annual survey of human rights practices, the State Department cited progress in some countries but stressed a series of "sobering realities" reflecting a significant deterioration in conditions in some of the world's most populous states like China and Russia. The U.S. has joined both of those countries in diplomatic efforts to resolve nuclear confrontations with Iran and North Korea.

"Genocide was the most sobering reality of all," it said in the 2006 "Country Reports on Human Rights Practices," noting that mass killings continued to "ravage" Darfur more than. 60 years after the world

The one-hour film, dubbed "Darfur Diaries: Messages from Home," will be shown at 4 p.m. Thursday in Room 130 of the Greenhaw Technical Arts Center on GBC's Elko campus.

Through a series of interviews, the film-makers provide a look into the lives of the people who have been exposed to human rights abuses, violence, dis-

placement and death.

"The film tells some of their stories and raises our awareness of the need to act to stop genocidal violence in Sudan," Flynn said in a statement.

toum, the State Department lashed out at the Sudanese government, blaming its military and proxy militia for the genocide in Darfur, the west-

ern Sudan region which more than 200,000 people have died and some 2.5 million have been displaced, according to some estimates.

"The Sudanese government and government-backed Janjaweed militia bear responsibility for the genocide in Darfur," it said, adding that they, along with indigenous rebels, had committed and continue to commit atrocities as the four-year-old war rages unabated.

"All parties to the conflagration committed serious abuses, including widespread killing of civilians, rape as a tool of war, systematic torture, robbery and recruitment of child soldiers," the report said.

Washington first declared the situation in Darfur a "genocide" in 2004 when then-Secretary of State Colin Powell used the word in congressional testimony but other countries and the United Nations have refrained from U.S. officials have recently toned down such language.

She heard of the attack on Pearl Harbor listening to the Sammy Kaye radio program as the family prepared to go to church. Two days later she sent a wire to Washington, D.C., advising officials she had her pilot's license and



ELKO — In every genre of music, it seems there are a few individuals who take the old tried and true methods of performing, and tweak them just enough to add a certain level of freshness to the genre.

Curtis Stigers, who plays at 7 p.m. Aug. 17 at Great Basin College's Reynolds Amphitheatre, is one of these individuals. Having taken classics by songwriters such as Sting and Willie Nelson, Stigers has expanded upon their sound to help fulfill what aficionados refer to as "modern jazz."

"This is my niche, my specialty," says Stigers in his official bio.

"I have a great love and an eclectic knowledge of a wide array of songwriters and musical genres, and I know how to bring them all together into one cohesive sound."

Stigers is a major club and theater draw. He has performed on both "The Tonight Show" and "The Late Show with David Letterman." Stigers has toured internationally with such musicians as Elton John, Bonnie Raitt, Eric Clapton and even Prince. JazzTimes referred to Stigers as "one of the greatest male jazz singers of his generation."

"What I'm after is a complex and ever-changing

thing, which makes it difficult to define who I am," Stigers said in his bio.

"I sing beautiful love songs, but I'm not really a crooner. I write, but I'm not just a singer-songwriter. I'm certainly a jazz singer but so much more, too."

Stigers cites influences which range from Led Zeppelin to Tom Waits and Louis Armstrong to The Clash as having had an effect on his appreciation and approach to music.

But rather than simply "revamping" other

tunes, he also writes his own material, including "Lullaby on the Hudson" and "Columbus Avenue" from his new album, "I Think It's Going to Rain Today."

"Columbus Avenue" is about the day he met and fell in love with his wife. "Lullaby on the Hudson" is about one night when he stayed up with his newborn

child in a tender moment between a father and his daughter.

Tickets for the event are \$15. Advance tickets may be purchased at Berg Hall on the GBC campus. In case of inclement weather, the event will be moved to the GBC Theatre.





Elko 'waits for Godot'

ELKO - "Weird" and "hard" are words often used to describe playwright Samuel Bucket's body of work with "Waiting For Godot," being the pinnacle. Even so, Great Basin College theater instructor and guru Trent Delong urges the public to not dismiss the play.

In an effort to bring one of the most popular pieces of modern theater to the Elko area and to educate those in attendance on the finer points of Beckett, Delong and the production's actors will have a series of performances at 7 p.m. Nov. 14 through Nov. 18 at GBC Theatre. At 6 p.m. on Nov. 16, there will be a pre-show discussion of "Godot" incorporating historical, theoretic and other topics.
"Waiting For Godot" tells the

story of two vagabonds, Gogo and Didi, who are in the countryside waiting for a man named Godot. While waiting, the two discuss various issues and have chance meetings that help develop what seems like a simple plot into serious social commentary.

While Beckett himself has repudiated that "Godot" is a largely symbolic production, symbolism is nonetheless evident throughout the

play, as are various social themes that Delong hopes to address before

the Nov. 16 performance.

Delong has recruited the veteran acting talents of Mary Flores, John acting talents of Mary Piores, John Terry, Kiley Piper, TonyPiper, and Tyler Cox. Piores and Darry play Gogo and Didi. According to Terry, playing Didi is a relief from previous productions he was in in that he doesn't have to formulate a different voice, and can draw from his own experiences of sitting around being bored. Drive of the edition themes audi-

One of the Common themes audite ences and feature of Beckett's work be encounter with "Codo" is the feeling of dentification with the characters. Through Gogo and Didi's boredom, they see the mundane nature of their own lives. For some this can be enlightening, but for others this is the counter-opposite of why they attend theatrical performances. Escapism is something one doesn't necessarily go to Beckett:for, since his work is simple, yet incred-

ibly engaging.
"There is much comedy and much tragedy in Beckettithat few plays (outside of some Shakespeare) really can merge so seamlessly," Delong said. "Many directors shy away from the lack of spectacle tree, a rock, ragged clothes. I relish it. All of that jazz is pushed aside and we deal with the reality of existence; the bare stage reflects how the characters are last bare throughout the play."







General admission is \$5. College students with a student ID will be admitted free.





ELKO - "The outskirts of normal" is a phrase used by one of the actors to describe "Danny and the Deep Blue Sea," a new production at Great Basin College.

John Terry and Mary Flores play Danny and Roberta in John Patrick Shanley's "Danny and the Deep Blue Sea." Trent DeLong is the director.

Danny is a self-loathing man prone to violence, and Roberta is a broken woman who holds a terrible secret. After the two meet in a bar in the Bronx, they begin a torrid affair that brings out the best and the worst — in both of them.

The play features adult language and themes.

The play is split between two sets. each featuring an unordinary form of seating. For the first scene, chairs are placed on the stage in a rectangle. For the second scene, bleachers are set up looking down on the action.

Slipping into these roles takes a certain amount of preparation. Terry said he draws from movies he has seen, and guys "macho-ing up at the bar."

DeLong said he settled on directing "Danny" because he wanted to do something that was "not just Shakespeare, not just musicals," which tend to be more common in small communities such astElko.

The play is a study in how every person is important - including their emotions and psychological hang-ups.

It also addresses the idea of what defines love.

"How do you say that one love is

more important than another?" said DeLong.

"They're monsters, but they are people," Terry said, suggesting they have a right to be heard despite their character flaws.

Flores said it's interesting for her to see what people's reactions are. She performed a piece from the second act of the play for a class she previously had with DeLong as the instructor.


Originally she and other actors looked at the play "Mud" as a possible production. When they defaulted to a two-person production, "Danny" came to mind. Producing something "dirty and primitive" still comes out in "Danny."

While some plays address the concept of a woman as "damaged goods," Flores said "Danny" does so, too - but from the woman's point of view.







ELKO — Great Basin College will now offer driver's education to high school and non-high school students in Elko, Eureka, Lander, Humboldt, Nye and White Pine counties.

According to Pat Warren, the

college's director of Continuing Education, the course can cut the amount of training the Department of Motor Vehicles requires of a student driver in half. "DMV requires 100 hours on a log of hours driven with an adult. With a driver's ed course the time is reduced to just 50 hours," she said.

Students can enroll in the course by clicking on the "driver's ed" icon on the college's Web site at www.gbcnv.edu

The eight-week, two credit course is delivered online and is taught by experienced local school district instructors with the driver's education endorsement. The first class starts Sept.

11 and a second section starts Oct. 16. High school students enjoy a special \$35 tuition fee. If a student has not been enrolled at GBC in the past, a once in a lifetime \$10 admission fee will also apply. Non high school students may also enroll but will pay the regular tuition fee.

In order to enroll, students must be 15½ by the end of the course. The class provides the student with sufficient knowledge to pass the Nevada state written driver examination. A passing grade on the written examination enables the student to obtain their driver's permit. One of the chief benefits of completing a driver's education

course are the discounts provid by many auto insurance comp nies.

4-14 Justice Hardesty to speak at GBC Constitution Day event

ELKO — Great Basin College will celebrate Constitution Day with a free lecture featuring Nevada Supreme Court Justice James W. Hardesty. The event takes place on Tuesday, Sept. 19, at 7 p.m. in the Great Basin College Theatre. It is free and open to the public.

Hardesty will discuss the Constitution, the Nevada state courts and citizenship. Hardesty was elected to the Nevada Supreme Court in 2004 after a career as a private attorney. He is the author of several published articles on libel, privacy and government access issues. He began his judicial career in 1998 when he was elected a judge at the Second Judicial District Court. He is a member of the Nevada Supreme Court Funding Commission and served on the Judicial Council of the State of Nevada.

Hardesty graduated from the University of Nevada, Reno, (where he was student body president his senior year) and the University of the Pacific, McGeorge School of Law.

Dr. Danny Gonzales, an instructor in the college's Social Sciences department, provides a primer on the U.S. Constitution.

"It sets forth the institutional structure of American government by granting and limiting governmental authority," he said. "The four major constitutional principles — separation of powers, federalism, limited government and judicial review — provide the foundation for the preservation of attributes found in a democratic society such as the representation and inclusion of ideas in governmental

decision making processes."

The chair of GBC's Humanities and Social Science department, Dr. Cyd McMullen, emphasizes the importance of having knowledge of the Constitution.

"Familiarity with the U.S. Constitution not only acquaints us with our rights, but reassures us of the resilience of the American system in uncertain times," he said. "The Constitution strikes a balance between individual rights and responsibilities, freedom and security, states' rights and national government. Written and ratified over 200 years ago, it has never gone out of date. Its principles still resonate in the 21st century, and under its "nec-

essary and proper" clause, the American government can adapt to new situations. It is truly a remarkable document."

GBC History Professor Dr. Peter Klem recognizes the relevance of marking the day.

"It is particularly important for us to engage in this discussion considering the state of our world and nation," he said. "For instance, consider the ever-shifting status of our civil rights as spelled out in the Constitution, in an age of terrorism. We've beer told we have to give some of them up, though never oberty specified which ones or follow long, in order to better protect our nation."

Klem says that it is interesting that those who disagree with the current erosion of civil rights may be considered "unpatriotic" when not too long ago those who defended Constitutional rights were considered the nation's greatest patriots.

"Quite frankly, considering the enormous amount of power that has accrued to the executive branch of our government since Sept. 11, 2001, the importance of Constitution Day may well be to remind people and government officials that we still have one," he said.

GBC's baccalaureate degree nursing program was granted initial accreditation by the Board of Commissioners for the National


The National League for Nursing Accrediting Commission, and its predecessor, the National League for Nursing, have stood for standards of excellence for all types of nursing education for over 50 years.
