

THE BASQUES

When in 1960 eight young Basque-Americans left Idaho for a vacation-visit in the seven traditional Basque provinces of the borderland between France and Spain, they already knew the traditional dances of the Basque country. Basque people had come to the western United States in numbers during the preceding century and had entered quickly and whole-heartedly into new lives as American citizens, but they had never forgotten its historic traditions. Basque names—names in a language related to no other in the world—abound today in the West, and Basque games and athletic contests enliven the picnics and festivals held by these devoutly Roman-Catholic people.

The traditional folk dancing has also been preserved, and from time to time classes have been offered, so that when the eight young dancers left for their vacation, they were already skilled. But in San Sebastian that summer they met a professional Basque dancing troupe from whom they drew new inspiration and learned new dances which they brought back to the United States.

They also brought back the name of the Basque troupe, and they formed a new organization called the Oinkari Basque Dancers. "Oinkari" is difficult to translate, but its meaning is close to "those who foot it fast."

The Oinkari Basque Dancers have taught the old dances to hundreds of Basque young people, and have staged exhibitions in many parts of the West. Representing Idaho at the Seattle World's Fair in 1962, they astounded audiences with their enthusiasm, their precision, and their grace. When they dance, there comes across the footlights to the audience a combination of whirling skirts and flying feet, of snapping fingers and snapping eyes, of exciting music with a complex beat, and of shouted exhortations and cries of joy. Even for spectators who do not share the inbred understanding which the Oinkari Basque Dancers have for their own traditions, the audible and visual impact is tremendous and unforgettable.
