NLN ACCREDITATION

Just five, short years ago, the GBC Nursing Department applied for an initial NLN accreditation. They were awarded five years initial accreditation, the highest they could receive at that time. On October 7, 8, and 9, the GBC Nursing Department will host a site visit and hopes to receive highest approval, eight years accreditation. The National League for Nursing (NLN) accreditation is a voluntary accreditation, but the one with the most significance among colleges and potential health care employers. Director of Nursing Georgeanna Smith says, "The NLN accreditation is also consistent with the State Board of Nursing accreditation. The standards are very stringent for the NLN accreditation. The State acknowledges the accreditation that meets their requirements as well." The Nursing Department has a third accreditation to meet, the Northwest Schools Accreditation.

The NLN team will meet with nursing faculty, administrators, directors, GBC faculty at large, nursing advisors, and current and past nursing students. GBC's Nursing Department will present their strengths to the NLN accreditation team including: stabilization of the program to 14 students (matching the number of faculty and clinical experiences to students); communication among nursing faculty, support from administration, faculty and staff; support from community (in the five county area); access to the UCCSN Board of Regents; contact with other UCCSN Nursing programs; positive relationships with clinical facilities administrators and staff; flexibility to meet students who live outside Elko (9 of the 28 students live outside Elko); new nursing facility; access to nursing/health related materials (LRC/AHEC); financial assistance for students; increased population pool; granted autonomy within the nursing unit; and flexibility to make changes and implement new ideas.

The GBC Nursing faculty also plans to strengthen and/or develop a more structured student preparation for the NCLEX-RN examination. The Nursing Department will have a computer room to help students train for the test, as the test is administered by computer rather than by manual testing. They will also continue to identify ways to serve students long distance, evaluate new clinical sites, survey community health care needs, administer their own follow-up surveys of nursing graduates, develop an on-going communication with graduates, and increase computer use into the curriculum.

The development of the nursing program began with the establishment of a practical nursing program, by the Elko County School District in 1958. Elko General Hospital assumed control of the practical nursing program until 1967, when the College was founded, and the program became part of the College. The practical nursing program continued with the addition of an associate degree nursing program in the Fall of 1978. In 1990, the practical nursing option was dropped, leaving the two-year associate degree nursing program.

Nursing Faculty Georgeanna Smith, Marilee Kuhl, and Martha Fenger believe the outcomes of the Associate Degree Nursing Program are to prepare the individual to receive an Associate of Applied Science Degree, successfully complete the examination for licensure as a registered nurse, and function as a beginning practitioner of nursing in a variety of health care settings. Smith says, "I would like to thank everyone for their help. I look forward to a very positive visit, and I look forward to introducing the team to the GBC family."

GBC CAFETERIA NOW COWBOY JOE'S *Café X*

■ **Greenhaw Publishes Article...**Dr. Charles Greenhaw published an article *People's Colleges at 25-Plus Years in the Community College Journal of Research and Practice*, March, 1997. The following is an excerpt from this article: *Community colleges emerged late in Nevada. In 1971, when colleges began to appear around the state, Nevada had but one. It was the bootstrapped creation of citizens in a little desert town, Elko Community College, created in 1967, was an orphan. The state legislature refused for a time to be its parent, hoping it would go away. Elko County had no means for sustaining it. When it was forced into the University of Nevada system in 1969 (the system itself was but a year old), Elko's college became a sort of foster child in an organization dominated by the historic University of Nevada at Reno (UNR) and Las Vegas, emerging University of Nevada at Las Vegas (UNLV).*

FALL REGISTRATION UNDERWAY

Fall semester registration is underway. Students are flocking to Student Services to plan their course schedules and to register in classes to assure their enrollment in the specific class section that works best for them. Many students balance work, home and family, and/or additional activities while taking classes.

In direct response to requests for more degree core classes in the daytime, Dean of Enrollment Management Lynn Mahlberg stated, "The Elko Fall Announcements and Course Roster has more degree and major-area classes that have two or three different day and time sections. This provides students the flexibility to plan a full load of classes by sequencing their schedule into a day plan or evening plan. There are approximately 450 courses, including 60 specific degree core area classes, from which students may choose from."

This fall semester, *Human Biology* (which is recommended for allied health majors and non-science majors to satisfy science core requirements for associate degrees and transfer core curriculum for state universities) will be offered in the morning as well as evening sections.

One of the Associate degree, Fine Arts, three-credit core requirement classes, *Beginning Drawing*, is scheduled one afternoon a week. For students who cannot attend during the week, another section will begin mid-semester on Friday nights, 5:30 to 9:30 p.m., and Saturday 8 a.m. to 1 p.m., for five selected weekends between October and November. *Individual and the Family*, fulfills an Associate degree Social Science requirement and is also scheduled for either a five-weekend section or morning section.

For the first time, *European Civilization*, which is one of the classes offered this semester to fulfill GBC Humanities core area, will be offered both day and evening times. Other core requirement classes with more than one section include: English 101, 107, History 101, Geography 103, Political Science 103, Psychology 101, Sociology 101, and Speech 113.

There are many other core degree requirement classes which were only able to be scheduled at one time period this semester. A complete listing of Fall 1997 courses that meet degree requirements can be found in the Elko, Ely-Eureka, Winnemucca-Battle Mountain, and Satellite Centers schedules. Students who have questions about how a class will fit their own educational goals should call Student Services, the Educational Center in their area, or check with their faculty advisor.



ADMINISTRATIVE UPDATE

Vice President for Administrative Services Carl Diekhans says, "Once again it has been a very busy summer. And, once again, the Buildings and Grounds crew has done an outstanding job with remodeling, landscaping, and keeping up with the maintenance of the buildings." To help with this increased work activity, GBC will seek three additional buildings and grounds personnel, and an additional facility attendant (security guard). Ely's (Joleen Coop) and Winnemucca's (Katie Simper) facility attendants have been changed from three-quarter to full-time employment.

The McMullen Hall addition should be completed by Christmas. The addition will have approximately 16 offices and should absorb the personnel located in the trailers (UNR, AHEC, Extension Office). Official acceptance of the Events Center from Public Works should take place the second week of September. Most of the equipment has been ordered with available money from the Foundation. 

GBC CELEBRATES 30 YEARS Meeting Facility Demands



Since the 25th anniversary celebration, Great Basin College has added six buildings to the Elko Campus and a new building each for the Winnemucca and Ely Educational Centers. Indeed, Great Basin College has been *Fulfilling 30 Years of Great Expectations*. The construction of these buildings required tremendous support from the community and the State of Nevada.

Many have watched the campus grow from College Parkway, Elm Street, or I-80. As the college prepares for its 30th anniversary, it is proud to open doors to a new physical education and recreation center. This building — GBC's most recent project — was funded by private and state funds. At a cost of \$1.5 million, the facility adds 10,000 square feet to Phase II of the College Community Center Complex. "We are excited to introduce the student body to even more athletic and recreational events right here on campus," says Student Development Specialist, Mara Van de Ven. With the opening of the new center, a new staff position has been created to promote physical fitness and intramural sports. This new position will round-out the physical education part of the curricula at GBC. Classes range from *Volleyball, Body Conditioning, Tai-Chi, Yoga, Hi-Lo Aerobics, Aerobics, and Creative Dance*. A summary of additional facilities and their completion dates is listed below:

Winnemucca Educational Center — May, 1995: This building was completely funded by the State of Nevada at a cost of \$1.3 million. The size of the facility is 11,000 square feet.

Elko Theatre — August, 1995: This building was funded by a combination of major gifts through the Foundation and state funds at a cost of \$2.6 million. The size of the facility is 13,000 square feet.

Elko Mark H. Dawson Child and Family Center — February, 1996: The Mark H. Dawson Child and Family Center was constructed through a combination of monies — donor Claude Howard, the Foundation, the State of Nevada and GBC, as well as contributions by child center students' families, and friends at a cost of \$650,000. The size of the facility is 5,090 square feet. The Child and Family Center is a multi-purpose resource for GBC and the community. The center provides early childhood studies. The center also represents an on-campus training facility for students in pursuit of a degree in early childhood education and an observation laboratory for nursing program students.

Ely Educational Center — August, 1996: This building was funded by an EDA grant and private funds raised in the community at a cost of \$1.5 million. The size of the facility is 10,000 square feet.

Adult Learning Center — September, 1996: The Adult Learning Center was relocated from McMullen Hall to a modular building adjacent to the college at 1020 Elm Street. This project was funded through GBC funds at a cost of \$120,000. The size of the facility is 2,000 square feet.

KENV TV Station — April, 1997: The TV station — built and owned by Sunbelt Broadcasting — provides classroom space for students who want to further their education in journalism. The size of the facility is 5,000 square feet.

Health Sciences Classroom Building — August, 1997: This building was built through State funds at a cost of \$1.3 million. The size of the facility is 11,000 square feet. This building provides office space for faculty and classroom space primarily for the nursing students.





Heading back to school after 40 — Humboldt Sun 10/29/96

Adults are looking for more training, a new career

Three years ago, Fritche Lage picked up a college career that started about 20 years ago and was interrupted when she dropped out of school to get married.

The Winnemucca resident is part of a national trend of baby boomers returning to college for a variety of reasons.

According to a national study released recently, just 477,000 people older than 40 were in college in 1970, but by 1993, that number had more than tripled, to over 1.6 million.

Many of those returning to school are looking for training in new skills to help them in their careers.

That was the case for Forrest Newton, the pastor of Lighthouse Baptist Church in Winnemucca, who signed up for a computer literacy class at Great Basin College when his church received a donated computer.

Since his church is small, Newton is the secretary as well as its minister, and he's learning the skills to use the computer to produce a newsletter and bulletins for his parish. Ida Jensen is a classmate of Newton's. The

45-year-old grandmother is the office manager and bookkeeper at Mezotrace and foresees the day when she'll need computer skills to function in every small business.

"I have to get into the computer age, as I have to work for 20 more years," she said.

“I just felt that I needed to finish what I started. The hardest part was finding out my family could survive without me.”

After some consideration of possible career paths, she decided to pick up where she left off with her teaching degree.

"I just felt that I needed to finish what I started," Lage said.

A little frightened of making the commit-

Lage's reasons for going back to school after her long hiatus were slightly more complicated.

She wanted training for a new career, rather than additional skills to help her in a job she already had.

With half the college credits for a teaching degree, she was overqualified for some jobs that were better than the one she had, but she still lacked the credentials for the teaching career she had dreamed of when she started college.

ment to return to college and afraid she'd forgotten how to be a student, she started slowly, with just a few classes at Great Basin College.

This year, Lage transferred to Sierra Nevada College for the upper-level courses she needed, and she now travels to Incline Village for classes three days a week.

When she's home, keeping up with her studies means that she's less available to her family than she would like.

"My kids think it's hilarious that I have homework," Lage said.

It helps that her two sons are 16 and 18 years old, with drivers licenses of their own, so they don't need her help with transportation to athletics practices or jobs. Her family has even learned to do their own laundry and make their own meals.

"The hardest part was finding out my family could survive without me," she said. "It's made the boys more independent."

Most of the other students in Lage's classes are other baby boomers returning to retrain for new careers.

In that respect, they reflect the findings of the national study, which reported that two-thirds of the older students are women, and some have returned to school after a divorce or after their children get older, giving them time to develop a career.

That's not the only reason school is different from Lage's college career of 20 years ago. The intervening time and life experience have matured her into a dedicated learner, less focused on grades and more on learning.

"I've learned how to learn," Lage said.

Fall enrollment in state college system increases over last year

Humboldt Sun 11-27-96
The number of students enrolled in the University and Community College System of Nevada has increased 9.4 percent over last fall, according to Chancellor Richard S. Jarvis.

"These figures show that our campuses went the extra mile in recruitment, resulting in across the board increases in both student headcount and full-time equivalency figures," Jarvis said in a news release last week.

The final fall 1996 enrollment for UCCSN was 74,655 students, an increase of 9.4 percent over last fall.

The state-supported headcount for fall 1995 was 68,230. The number of full-time students this fall is 40,016, as compared to 36,937 the year before.

This fall, 454 students are registered at the Winnemucca campus.

Those students translate into 120 full-time equivalents, after adjusting the number because many students attend only part-time, out of 1,010 full-time equivalent students for Great Basin College as a whole.

Jarvis credited the statewide "Go to College" campaign for the strong enrollment figures.

"The strong figures indicate that the UCCSN is back on track with a solid growth rate, one properly reflecting the state's population dynamics and one which we will sustain over the next biennium," he said.

Great Basin College's efforts to recruit new students in order to build a larger student base included an expansion of student services through the hiring of two part-time academic advisors and tutoring in critical skills.

The new programs led to an increase in the number of students at the Winnemucca Education Center during the spring, 1996, semester.

Approximately 500 students enrolled at the college in January, including 110 full-time students taking at least 15 credits.

The school's next priority will be the creation of a comprehensive vocational program, notwithstanding the lack of funding to build a vocational training center on campus, according to director Barbara Tenney.

"We're looking at some alternate things we can do to help the mines," Tenney said.

Rather than focusing on obtaining a building for the vocational program — at least for now

— Great Basin College has hired instructors to take classes in diesel maintenance, hydraulics, mill maintenance and other mining-related subjects to minesites.

Most of the classes will be available soon after the beginning of the year, but some mines have already taken advantage of the college's vocational training by offering classes in accounting and budgeting and practical math.

"It depends a lot on what the individual mine's needs are," Tenney said.

Concern about the number of Nevada students enrolling in colleges rose last year in the wake of a report from Jarvis' office that revealed that only 33 percent of Nevada's high school graduates were going on to college.

Only 15 percent of Nevada adults had received a bachelor's or higher degree, making Nevada the western state with the lowest percentage of adults with college experience.

Humboldt Sun 12-11-96 College now more affordable for people moving to Nevada

The Board of Regents for the University and Community College System has just made college more affordable for residents who come to Nevada to work.

The board has adopted a new policy that gives residency status to people who live in Nevada for the primary purpose of permanent full-time employment, and their dependents.

The new rule will help those who move into Humboldt County for a job and then decide to take some classes at Great Basin College, said Winnemucca Education Center director Barbara Tenney.

Before the new policy was adopted, those people were classi-

fied as nonresidents for a year after their arrival and were required to pay nonresident fees to take college classes.

"It has been a problem for us, and we have lost some students because of that," Tenney said. "This will help us a lot."

Out-of-state students, a category that no longer includes those covered by the new policy, currently pay \$1,600 per semester in tuition in addition to the regular \$36.50 per credit fee charged for classes at Great Basin College.

Out-of-state students taking six credits or less pay \$15.50 per credit in tuition charges plus the \$36.50

Teen mom plans a future for herself and her daughter

Susan graduated from Lowry High School last June and is now attending Great Basin College and working toward an associate's degree.

She lives with her parents and works part-time as a physical therapy aide at Rehab and Industrial Services.

After she finishes her associate's degree, she plans to go to a university for further study to become a physical therapist.

"I want to be a physical therapist because I love what I'm doing now. I love working with the kids," she says.

When she goes away to school, she'll take her daughter, now 18 months old, along with her.

Susan became pregnant during her junior year of high school and, while her daughter is unquestionably one of the best things that ever happened to her, motherhood has — equally unquestionably — complicated Susan's life enormously.

"I don't think most people realize how hard it can be," she says.

Susan transferred from Lowry High School to the PASS alternative school during her junior year and managed to finish out the year even though she missed some classes when she went into premature labor and her doctor ordered bedrest.

To make up for the missed time, Susan signed up for summer classes.

"I tried summer school, but I only lasted a day and then my daughter came," she says.

Susan's daughter was delivered prematurely by Caesarean section at Humboldt General Hospital. It was quickly apparent that she had health problems, so the baby was trans-

ferred to a Reno hospital while Susan recovered from her surgery in Winnemucca.

"I'd cry, because I'd see all the other parents with their babies, and I'd wish my daughter could be here with me," she says. "That was horrible."

Susan had hoped for emotional support from her baby's father during the trying time, but none was forthcoming. He simply denied paternity and stayed away.

Susan's daughter remained in the Reno hospital for two and a half weeks for complications from her prematurity that included apnea and seizures. Doctors told Susan her daughter would probably never walk.

"You never think your baby's going to be sick," Susan says.

The hospital bill added up to over \$50,000 by the time the baby had gained weight and learned to suck a bottle so she could be released from the hospital.

Since Susan was a single mother with only limited resources, Saint Mary's Regional Medical Center decided not to ask her to pay their bill, so Susan wasn't saddled with an enormous debt that could have forced her to seek a job instead of finishing high school.

That fall, Susan started her senior year of school at PASS, where the teachers were understanding about her need for a schedule that was flexible enough to accommodate her daughter's medical appointments and frequent illnesses.

Although Susan's baby is much healthier than doctor's once thought she'd ever be, her continuing disability qualified her for supplemental security income, and Medicaid pays for a physical therapist to come to Susan's home.

"There are doctor's appointments galore," Susan says.

Starting this fall, her schooling has been paid for by a re-entry program that supplies

tuition, books and child care assistance. Susan took four classes and, while she hasn't got her grades yet, she thinks she's done pretty well.

Still, she worries about how long the money will be available to help her go to school, and her baby has recovered from her early problems so well that she may be disqualified for supplemental security income under new rules that allow assistance only for substantial disability.

Her baby's father has reconciled himself somewhat to the situation and now sees his daughter occasionally, but he hasn't yet agreed to pay child support. Susan is taking him to court, where she must first prove that he is indeed the father of her baby.

She is lucky that her parents have promised they'll continue to support her as long as she stays in school.

"The one thing that was most important to my parents was my future," she says.

Job training is available through re-entry program

The Re-Entry Center at Great Basin College pays class fees, books and child care assistance for single parents, displaced homemakers, and other economically disadvantaged students.

The goal of the state-funded program is to provide job training so people can become self-sufficient.

"A large majority of the people in our program are welfare clients," said Pat Collins, re-entry center director. "We help them spread their wings."

The college invests about \$600 per semester for each of the 150 to 200 students in the program, and eventually the state will recover

that money through the taxes those students will pay on the higher incomes they can expect once they have completed their educations.

"I think it's better to get people in school and pay for it so they can have a future. If not, they'll stay on welfare," said one of the students in the program.

Students who come into the re-entry center are assessed and then placed in educational programs ranging from diesel mechanics to nursing or office occupations that match their interests and abilities.

Once they complete the training available at Great Basin College, the re-entry center

provides job placement assistance or will help locate financial assistance for further training at a university.



"Topics in Education: Exploring the Internet" will be offered by the University of Nevada, Reno in McDermitt Jan. 22 and 23.



Marvel requests funding for Great Basin campus

Some much-needed vocational training equipment may be on the way to Great Basin College's Winnemucca Education Center if the state legislature can be persuaded to see things Assemblyman John Marvel's way.

Marvel has introduced a bill to the state Assembly that asks for over \$400,000 for the Winnemucca Education Center to purchase items trimmed from the budget when the facility was constructed.

"Now I've got to get it passed," he said, adding that legislative approval of the appropriations bill is by no means guaranteed.

News of Marvel's efforts on the college's behalf was greeted with pleasure by WEC director Barbara Tenney.

"I'm really surprised. I was hoping this would happen," she said.

The additional equipment would bring the Winnemucca Education Center in line with what was originally envisioned for it, before budget shortfalls forced plans to be cut back.

The requested funding would provide a fully-equipped mobile unit for on-site electrical

training, a satellite dish and big screen television, 10 welding stations, 50 new computers, 10 electronics work benches, and five sets of equipment for physics experiments.

The college has also requested upgrades for their existing computers and software, new large monitors for interactive video, and equipment to maintain the building and grounds.

The bill is Assembly Bill 33, which has been referred to the Ways and Means Committee.

It will be competing for funds with legislators' proposals for funding for a veterans home in southern Nevada, \$10,000 for preparation and framing of a portrait of Gov. Bob Miller, and \$10 million to cover costs of the legislature.

Governor Miller has proposed a budget that would allocate \$560 million for the state's universities and community colleges, including \$143 million for the University of Nevada, Reno and \$159 million for the University of Nevada-Las Vegas.

Miller's budget also calls for a community college tuition hike of almost 20 percent for non-residents and \$1.50 per credit for residents.

College has new executive director

The new executive director at the Winnemucca Educational Center of Great Basin College isn't sure yet about the direction new programs will be taking, but he is sure about the which way enrollment numbers will be going.

Up.

Gary Corderman has become executive director for the Great Basin College educational centers in Ely, Battle Mountain, and Winnemucca.

Barbara Tenney remains the Winnemucca Center director, but Corderman has been assigned to grow each of the three educational centers outside the college's main campus in Elko.

"I want to try to look at where we're going and then dovetail that into the college's five-year plan," Corderman said.

Great Basin College's mission includes five major educational services: university transfer courses, vocational and technical training, partnerships with business and industry, developmental education and community service classes.

Corderman is looking at programs already offered by the Winnemucca Educational Center to identify gaps where the college's offerings are not meeting its mission. Those gaps will be the starting points for change.

Among the possibilities being considered are increasing the offerings for vocational and technical training, adding more courses for people who want to have fun while they learn something new, and offering courses to younger people.

A first step will be a planning process that involves members of the community. Corderman is consulting local employers and other community leaders to try to gain an idea of what Humboldt County wants from Great Basin College.

Those ideas will then be translated rapidly into action.

"I have a natural bias toward action — toward moving forward and letting the chips fall," he said.

The ultimate goal is to transform Great Basin College into the community's first choice for education and training.

Local employers have already said that more vocational and technical training is needed in the community.

The college is already seeking funding through the state legislature for equipment to do that, but the

eventual goal will be construction of a technical training facility.

The way to get the funding to build a technical center is to demonstrate a real need for the facility, much the way the college was able to earn the Winnemucca Educational Center from the legislature by showing that students were already enrolling for many classes, Corderman said.

The college must first start providing more technical training with the facilities and equipment already available in the community and on jobsites, and then it can use those enrollments to show that a permanent center is needed, he said.

If the college begins offering more technical training now with funding provided by this year's legislature, a new technical arts center could become a reality as early as 1999, according to Corderman.

To have a successful program, the college must offer courses in fields where jobs will be available as students complete their studies, the financial resources to begin, and enough students interested in particular fields of study, Corderman said.

Identifying the areas where those three ingredients for success are already present will be part of the planning process being undertaken with members of the community.

Eventually, the Winnemucca Educational Center could grow from a single-building facility with a few full-time instructors to something

more comparable to the Western Nevada Community College center at Fallon, which has three buildings and 23 full-time faculty.

"There's no reason why with a little more growth we can't have a full campus," Corderman said. "Winnemucca has all the potential to be a full campus with three buildings in five years."

A full campus in Winnemucca would offer its students the opportunity to attend full-time to meet their educational goals, he added.

Building that kind of campus will take a willingness to offer new programs, flexible scheduling to meet the needs of students, increased use of innovative educational technologies such as interactive video classes and computer online classes, and a marketplace orientation.

"What we sell is an opportunity to get an education," Corderman said.

To make all that happen, the new executive director will be based at the Winnemucca Educational Center.

Until he can move to Winnemucca, he is commuting from Ely, where he has been the educational center director for the past three years. Before that, he served 20 years in the U.S. Navy.

His Navy experience includes five years associated with technical and officer training programs, and his last assignment was as director of training at the Naval Transportation Management School in Oakland, Calif.

Great Basin College looks ahead

Community employers, educators, and other leaders agree that Great Basin College should provide more vocational training classes in Humboldt County, according to the executive director of the Winnemucca Educational Center.

Nineteen members of the community met with officials from Great Basin College Wednesday evening to discuss community needs for future educational programs at the college.

"Almost every input that we received indicated a desire for vocational training," said Gary Corderman, executive director for the college's three educational centers in rural northeastern Nevada.

Additional planning is needed to identify specific programs that can be offered by the college that will meet the needs of local employers, Corderman said.

That will probably start with focus group meetings of representatives from the mining and hospitality industries. There may be ways of starting a hospitality training program without great expense by coordinating with a trade group

that already offers training, he said.

The college may also be able to offer training in process technology and safety that could benefit mining as well as other local industries.

"It's a program that's not tailored specifically to mining, but it's applicable," Corderman said.

A process technology training program could draw on resources already available at the Elko campus of Great Basin College to reduce local start-up costs.

Corderman will be investigating similar training programs already offered in other parts of the country

to refine ideas about what might be feasible for Winnemucca, and local mining industry executives will be consulted on their particular needs before a program is designed.

In addition to the vocational training, other potential future programs for the college were discussed Wednesday evening by the community group.

"A wider range of courses came out and the community service fun-type courses came out as something that could attract people to the college," Corderman said.

His goal in convening the group was to begin planning how to boost enrollment at the Winnemucca Education Center by offering new programs that would do a better job of meeting community needs.

While the initial meeting was very productive, much additional planning is needed, according to Corderman.

"We didn't get everything done that we wanted to," he said.

As part of that planning, Corderman will be seeking additional public comment in the future. Anyone with good ideas to contribute is invited to call Corderman at Great Basin College, 623-4824.

\$200,000 slips in for college center

The Nevada Assembly has passed a bill that will provide funds for vocational training at Great Basin College, although the college won't get as much money as its administrators had hoped.

AB33 had asked for over \$400,000 for the Winnemucca Education Center to purchase items trimmed from the budget when the facility was constructed, but the final bill passed by the Assembly allotted only \$350,000 for facilities in both Winnemucca and Minden.

Great Basin College will get about \$200,000 of that amount, according to Ron Remington, college president.

"It's a shot in the arm to get the \$200,000, and we owe a vote of thanks to John Marvel for that," Remington said.

Assemblyman Marvel introduced the bill to provide the Great Basin College funding.

Additional equipment funded by the bill

would bring the Winnemucca Education Center closer to what was originally envisioned for it, before budget shortfalls forced plans to be cut back.

Funding was requested for a fully-equipped mobile unit for on-site electrical training, a satellite dish and big screen television, 10 welding stations, 50 new computers, 10 electronics work benches, and five sets of equipment for physics experiments.

The college has also requested upgrades for their existing computers and software, new large monitors for interactive video, and equipment to maintain the building and grounds.

The cutback in the funding authorized by the legislature has left Great Basin College officials scratching their heads about which proposals will be sacrificed to fit the smaller budget.

"We'll need to get together with a whole lot of people to decide that," Remington said.

It took teen mom extra work, dedication to get her diploma

Candice Hotz is a little smarter now than when she got pregnant at the age of 14 — and she's got the high school diploma to prove it.

Hotz graduated from Lowry High School along with her class this June, just a few days after her son Taylin turned three.

It's not a course she advises for others.

"If you have family support and a good job, it might work out, maybe," she says she'd tell other young people considering a school-age pregnancy.

"Take my kid for a couple of days — you'll change your mind."

Hotz attributes her success at combining motherhood with education to the Humboldt County School District's PASS program, which gave her the chance to complete high school on a schedule flexible enough to wrap around child care availability and her son's illnesses.

With diploma in hand, she plans to attend Great Basin College's nursing program and eventually specialize in obstetrical and gynecological nursing, following the example of an aunt who's a nurse.

"I've always wanted to work at the hospital since I was in elementary school," she says.

She'll pay for school with the money she's earning this summer as a student employee at Newmont Gold's Twin Creeks Mine, where her mother works as a security guard, and perhaps some help from the college's re-entry program for single mothers.

The college education and eventual nursing career was a dream that was nearly derailed by an unplanned pregnancy during her freshman year of high school.

"I just thought I'd ruined my life — it was over with — that I was 14 years old, and I'd have to go out and get a job and support a family."

Even before she found out she was pregnant, Hotz was having trouble fitting in at Lowry.

"I hated it. I was always ditching and stuff just to get away," she says.

She found it hard to keep up with her classes, especially since she was spending many of her evenings partying, and she felt that her teachers didn't care very much about her.

"I was too wrapped up in having fun all the time, and bam! I'm going to be a mom," she says. "I thought, 'All my friends are having sex, and I won't get pregnant,' then bam, it smacked me right on the head."


Getting pregnant put an end to the parties and to her relationship with her baby's father, who is several years older than she.

"He told me he was 17 when I met him, and then I found out he'd turned 21, so he lied to me," she says. "We don't get along, although I try to for Taylin."

Hotz transferred into the PASS program for the second semester of her freshman year, and there she found the encouragement, the individualized instruction, and the freedom from unrelenting peer pressure that kept her in school.

After she had her baby, Hotz tried going back to Lowry, but she found that the regular high school schedule was too rigid for a mother with a sick baby.

Taylin has full-blown asthma and serious eczema and has been in the hospital twice for those illnesses.

"I was too tired because of being woken up at night," his mother says.

Taylin's medical bills have been paid by Medicaid, with some extra help from Hotz's parents.

"If it weren't for my parents and Medicaid, I'd be in total debt," she says.

When the absences from school started adding up and Hotz fell behind in her work, she transferred back to the PASS program during her sophomore year.

Hotz's child care was arranged by pooling duties with her two sisters, Lori and Dona, and the PASS teachers allowed her to attend school when she could and make up necessary absences later.

It still wasn't easy, and Hotz still had eight credits to complete at the beginning of her senior year. During the last few weeks of last semester, she worked late into the night to complete the requirements for her diploma.

"I fell behind in my credits really bad," Hotz says. "I worked my butt off."

The young mother was all the more determined to finish high

school because she recognized that she'd need job skills to provide a good life for her baby and herself.

It's important for girls to expect to provide for themselves and their children instead of counting on a man who may not stay around to do it, she says.

"You should never really rely on anybody besides yourself to do anything," she says. "All my friends decide to get married and have a baby, and two months later they're divorced."

Taylin receives child support from his father — after Hotz sought enforcement of the order from the district attorney's office, but he doesn't participate in child care duties.

"He doesn't call or come over or anything," Hotz says.

For now, when she isn't learning job skills at Twin Creeks, Hotz is teaching her son his colors and letters of the alphabet and reading to him so he'll eventually be ready for kindergarten.

"I love him. There's sometimes I'd like to go out when I can't, but otherwise, I don't mind staying home with him," she says. "I've just matured. It's opened my eyes."

Educational opportunities — GBC has new offerings for fall

Mill, maintenance, and automotive technicians, or those who'd like to learn the skills for a technical career, are among those invited to take a new class at Great Basin College that teaches practical applications of physics.

For those who are looking for something else in an education, Great Basin College's Winnemucca Education Center is offering a wide variety of other new and familiar classes as well.

Technical Physics 107/108 B is a two-semester course in which students will investigate how the physics concepts of force, work, and power relate to mechanical, electrical, hydraulic, and thermal systems.

The knowledge and skills covered in the class have direct applications to real-world technical occupations in the automotive, industrial, and construction fields, according to instructor Jim Blattman.

"We are after the group of people who are working in mills or want to work in mills or are doing any type of technical work," he said.


Students will do much of their learning through hands-on experiments using real equipment or smaller models of real equipment such as motors, pumps, electrical devices, hydraulic cylinders and gauges.

"The materials are the neatest part for us," he said.

The class will use a total of about \$50,000 worth of new equipment purchased jointly by Humboldt County School District, Great Basin College, and private donations, according to Blattman.

During their two semesters in the class, students will do about 100 different experiments using a wide variety of equipment.

Although no prerequisite courses are required, students need a working knowledge of mathematics and are advised to have taken or be taking

Technical Math 110.

Lowry High School students may also take the same course, except that the high school version is offered over two years rather than two semesters. Content is identical, but the college-level class moves faster, Blattman said.

The high school version is titled Principles of Technology.

Great Basin College is also offering a new pair of classes aimed at those interested in the building trades. Construction 102B is an interactive video course in blueprint reading and specification for construction, and

Construction 103B is an interactive video course in building codes and standards.

The college is also offering an introduction to computer-aided drafting.

Those who are thinking about a career in firefighting may want to check out Fire Science 110B — Introduction to Wildland Fire Fighting.

Field work is required in the course, and satisfactory completion entitles the student to National Wildland Fire Certification — the red card carried by trained wildland firefighters and required for employment on federal wildland firefighting crews.

Supervisors and managers can take advantage of Management 171 — Supervision, an introduction to basic management techniques required of first-line managers, or a trio of management courses that explore


communication, team building, and problem solving for managers.

For future pilots, there's basic ground school for pilots, and the college also offers Federal Aviation Administration testing.

Computer jockeys might want to check out a variety of classes that offer students chances to learn more about the Internet or career-related software.

Students taking college computer courses will learn on newly-acquired Pentium 200s

Great Basin College's Winnemucca Education Center has new computers and a wide variety of classes to teach people how to use them listed in its fall semester schedule.

The college has just unpacked 26 new Pentium 200 computers purchased with part of \$200,000 in new funding for the college's vocational classes, and additional software and equipment is also on the way.

The bill to provide the funding was sponsored by Assemblyman John Marvel and passed during the closing hours of the last legislative session.

The older computers that were replaced by the new faster machines are now in service at Great Basin College's Battle Mountain Education Center.

The college's computer instructors will be using the new hardware and software to teach a variety of classes ranging from how to build web pages on the Internet to software applications such as word processing and computer-aided drafting.

A few classes on topics other than computer skills are being offered online this semester, and students can complete those either at home with their home computers and commercial Internet access or by using the college's computers.

Many of the classes are self-paced, so students can adapt their study needs to their work schedule.

The computer skills classes offered for the fall semester include instruction on exploring the Internet — there's a class specifically for educators and another for anyone who's

interested.

For students who aren't ready to venture onto the 'Net and need basic computer instruction, there are classes in basic computer literacy, even one called "Making Friends with your Computer."

ONLINE CLASSES


Online classes offer college courses through independent study. They are enhanced by quality communication with an instructor. Communication is through an electronic bulletin board located on the Elko campus. To take an online class, you need a modem-equipped computer. If you are taking a computer class, you also need access to the software studied. Before taking an online course, you must complete COT 108 – Accessing Coyote Telegraph, which teaches you how to make use of the bulletin board. COT 108 is a three-lesson, half-credit course that can be completed during the first week of a semester, before you complete other online classes. INTERNET CLASSES

Internet online classes use a different medium. Instead of communicating through an electronic bulletin board, they use the Internet. To take Internet classes, students need access to a modem-equipped computer and the software studied. You must be set up with your own commercial access to the Internet. The college can not provide dial-in Internet access at this time. You must be proficient enough in Internet use to be able to complete electronic mail and access the college's World Wide Web site. GBC Training Underground Miners

In the next few years Nevada may need as many as 1,000 underground miners. But where is the mining industry going to find them? According to the University of Nevada, Reno's Ed Jucevic, you won't find them in Nevada, Canada or any other mining regions. That's why he spearheaded a program to train underground miners.

The Nevada Mine Training Institute started training underground miners on Monday, Nov. 4, at Great Basin Community College in Elko. Students go through 160 hours of classroom and onsite training that prepares them for work in underground mining. Right now there are about 25 students enrolled, says Paul Normandie, who's a Great Basin instructor and chairman of the institute.

Sen. Harry Reid, D-Nev., speaking to Mackay School of

Mines alums last week in Reno, gave his support for the program.

"My dad was an underground miner and I worked in the mines with him. But the industry isn't like it was in those days. Technology has changed the way we mine in Nevada. We should be training our own miners here in Nevada. I commend the Mackay School of Mines for being involved in this. Underground mining is the wave of the future in Nevada."

Jucevic, who recently was named alumnus of the year by the Mackay School of Mines, says there are about 600 underground miners in Nevada. "Within the next two years, there will be a need for over 500 new underground miners and over the following three years a possible addition of 500."

Wages for underground miners are excellent, says Jucevic, an adjunct mining professor. "Starting pay is in the \$10 to \$14

range. Earnings for good miners with two to three years experience is in the \$50,000 to \$60,000 range."

And mining companies are supporting the program through scholarships for students. It cost \$600 to attend the institute and Newmont and Independence are providing seven scholarships. The Nevada Employment Security office in Elko is funding five scholarships, as is the Winnemucca office.

The course is open to anyone who's at least 18, is in good physical condition and is drug free. The four-week class includes four-hour sessions taught by mining company instructors, mine suppliers, Great Basin and Mackay faculty. The Nevada Mine Safety and Training Department will conduct the 32 hours of safety training.

They seem to be catching on, and the college here now offers many classes via interactive.

The college has to offer many new and exiting classes. There are classes in almost anything, country line dancing classes are offered as well as math and english classes. There are even classes desinged to teach about wildfire fighting.

Next up for the class is the "Tush Push," requiring certain gyrations of the hips that some get a head start on by rolling their hips in practice before the music starts.

"I think most of the time they enjoy laughing at me because I make mistakes," Koll said.

Prior to the class starting, he claimed to be struggling with the line dancing moves, but with Koll leading the way and the music blaring, he never loses step with the others.

"This is enjoyable," he said. "I'm getting quite a workout at it."

Great Basin College Coordinator Michelle Scovil said she is surprised by the popularity of the line dancing class. The course is worth three college credits at \$36.50 each from Great Basin.

"I was trying to find something when I was doing my spring semester that would offer a little more excitement and fun than just the standard educational classes that we have," she said.

Hurdles Cleared For Day Care

Battle Mountain has seen a number of firsts in the last few months, and the list is being enlarged with the town's first day care center.

Tammy Hughes and Jo Ann Groves, seeing a decided need for such a facility, opened up the Battle Mountain Day Care Center on Tuesday, April 1, with two children signed up the first day.

The road for the center's opening was cleared by the Bureau of Child Care Licensing on Thursday, March 27, when Lynette Remington, a child care surveyor, presented the two with a license from the state to operate.

Hughes said that she and Groves had first got the idea for a child care center in October. "There was a very bad lack of one here," she said of the existence of day cares.

The biggest challenge so far, she said, "is getting everything going." To start up the center, there were a number of hurdles the pair had to cross.

These roadblocks were described in some detail by Remington. The

two had to be fingerprinted by the Federal Bureau of Investigation, and had to take tuberculosis tests.

But that was just the tip of the iceberg. The space they are renting, located at 301 North Second, had to be inspected by the state fire marshal, as well as receiving health inspections.

Further, both had to take child care classes at Great Basin College and at the Zion Lutheran Preschool in Winnemucca.

The bureaucratic obstacles, said Hughes, were the toughest part of getting the day care up and running.

"It was very hard, a long process," she said. "You have to go through a lot of red tape."

Remington notes that despite all the hurdles, Hughes and Groves persevered. "They really wanted to do this," she said.

In addition to those bureaucratic requirements, Groves and Hughes had a number of fees to pay to clear the way for their license.

The bureau's fee ran \$100, said Remington, while the cost to get printed by the FBI was \$40.

Add to that monthly rent from the owner of the building on North Second, the fee for a business license in Lander County, and liability insurance on each child in the program.

Remington said that Hughes and Groves had jumped through all the legal and financial hoops, and felt that they were good to go.

"I personally feel like it's a very safe environment and that these ladies are very responsible," she said.

"We hope that we'll do really well," said Hughes, saying that she and Groves sees the day care center as much a community effort as it is a business.

Later on, she added, they hope to have their own building to operate out of. However, it will be a while before they see a profit, Hughes conceded.

Their rates are \$75 a week for one child, or \$20 a day for four days or less. Parents are welcome to come in anytime and check on their children, Hughes added. "A lot of people feel more comfortable with that," she said.

High Schoolers Can Take College Classes

The Great Basin College, in coordination with the high school, is again offering college Dual Credit and Early Studies Programs for juniors and seniors next school year. Dual Credit Courses provide an outstanding opportunity for students to earn transferable college credits while satisfying high school requirements. The Early Studies Program enables

juniors and seniors to take any college transferable course while in high school. With Early Studies, a student starting to take college classes as a junior could enter college as a sophomore!

The college will be giving English and Math placement tests this week at the Battle Mountain High School. The test results will indicate the student's college-level

placement in these subjects. Those eligible are qualified to enroll in English 101 (Composition) and Math 126 (Pre-calculus). These courses meet high school credit requirements and fully transfer to UNR, UNLV, and almost all other colleges.

In addition, Dual Credit is available for COT 281 (Microcomputer Business Systems) which transfers to UNR as a computer lab course, CIS 253. This class provides students with hands-on skills using the latest Microsoft programs, i.e., Windows, Excel (spreadsheet) and Access


(database). These are common computer programs used in business and industry. Even if college is not in your child's plans, COT 281 will provide computer skills directly related to work. There is no placement test or prerequisite for the microcomputer class. As arranged with the high school, this class will count as a general high school elective. We expect this class to fill fast.

Other Early Studies College Classes are also available which do not count for high school credit, but provide transferable college credits. Contact the Great Basin College, Battle Mountain Center, at 835 North 2nd Street or call 635-2318 to find out more about how your child could enter college with many core college requirements already completed. The benefits include substantial cost savings and would provide your child with a running-start toward his/her college goals. To qualify for these college courses, high school permission is required.





Mining for chocolate chips in cookies set the stage for learning about mining, reclamation, job opportunities, profit and loss, finalized by a

tour of BHP. The eight days began with a demonstration of teamwork provided by Cheryl Harris of BHP when students learned the "boardwalk". Other group activities also culminated toward application of teamwork later in the week for lunch preparation.

Several part time GBC instructors introduced the youth to their fields of expertise at the college level. Erin Baker demonstrated that they could learn sign language throughout the week and Dr. Frank Daniels helped them wind their way through the Web as well as learn other computer programs. Students now registering for fall semester at GBC

Great Basin College is now signing up students for the fall semester, which begins Sept. 3.

Residents throughout the county who receive their mail by home delivery should have received a copy of the course schedule. Copies are also available at the Student Services Office inside GBC's Berg Hall at 1500 College Parkway.

Students may register by telephone by calling 753-2100. Telephone registration hours are 8 a.m. to 9 p.m. Monday through Friday, noon to 10 p.m. Saturday and noon to 6 p.m. Sunday. Those who need assistance in registering by telephone may drop by the Student Services Office. Credit cards will be accepted and all fees must be received by the college by 5 p.m. Aug. 27.

New students need to complete an application form, included in the class schedule, before enrolling. Forms are also available at Student Services. New students must wait one week after submitting applications to register by telephone.

Walk-in registration will be available from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. beginning Aug. 27 inside the Student Services Office. It will be the only registration accepted beginning Aug. 28.

GBC offers a number of special services that are especially helpful to the new student or the student returning to school after a long absence.

Advisement is now available in the Student Services Office and new students are encouraged to make an appointment by calling 753-2102. GBC faculty will also be available to answer questions when they return to campus Aug. 19.

Placement testing is required for students who plan to enroll in an English or mathematics course for the first time. Free testing is available from 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. Monday through Friday. Wednesday hours will be extended to 7 p.m. beginning Aug. 7.

Students may bypass placement testing by presenting their college placement testing scores at the Student Services Office.

Financial aid, including grants, loans, work-study, tuition waivers, deferred tuition payments and scholarships, is available at the Student Financial Services Office. Financial Aid Director Joan Williams encourages anyone needing financial assistance to stop by the office in Berg Hall or call 753-2287.

The GBC Re-Entry Center, located in Berg Hall, assists economically disadvantaged students, single parents, teen parents, displaced homemakers, disabled individuals and high school dropouts with job placement services, pre-employment training and career counseling and guidance. Those interested may call 753-2243 or 753-2299.

The GBC Employer Services/Job Placement Office provides listings of part-time and full-time jobs both on and off campus. Special efforts will be made to help students gain entry into jobs that are related to their occupational interests, according to GBC. Job openings are also posted on bulletin boards in Berg, McMillen and Lundberg Halls.

Orientation sessions are provided each semester to acquaint new students with the University and Community College System of Nevada, college ways and terms, programs of study and degree requirements, keys


to academic success and campus support programs. New students enrolling for six or more credits are required to attend an orientation session. New students may also want to register for college preparatory classes being offered in August.

The GBC English Department will offer two concurrent writing workshops to help students prepare to take English 101. Writing Workshop II will cover sentence and paragraph structure and punctuation. Writing Workshop III will introduce students to writing paragraphs and short essays. Both workshops are scheduled from 7:30 to 9:30 a.m. Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Friday Aug. 12-30. 

It has come to our attention that the 6th Annual Golf Tournament planned for May has been canceled. We believe that the Golf Tournament is a great activity in bringing students, faculty and staff together. The ASB also acknowledges the amount of participation this event receives each year. We feel that the Golf Tournament should continue as a traditional activity for our campus and should not be canceled. We will assist in any way possible, however, we can not do it financially.

We would now like to take this time to thank those who have participated in our activities this year. We have received a great deal of support from GBC faculty, staff, and students. We encourage all to participate in our upcoming events:

GBC'S ASSOCIATED STUDENT BODY

A condensed article from the *Elko Daily Free Press* written by Carol Hendershot on April 8, 1997.

Getting involved and making a difference is the name of the game for Great Basin College's Associated Student Body officers. And they like to see a lot of people enjoying the activities they sponsor. Mara Van de Ven, Student Development Specialist, said, "Every GBC student is a member of the ASB and everyone is welcome to come to the weekly meetings, make suggestions, and run for office."

ASB officers find more to do than just study. Past activities the ASB has sponsored include the annual Taco Feed, participation in Oktoberfest and the Scary Pumpkin Contest, the annual Turkey Feed, Christmas sing-along and bonfire, Suitcase Dance, Valentine Balloon sale/delivery, movie nights, drug and alcohol awareness seminars, high school recruiting tours, faculty/student/staff softball, textbook exchange, and the annual Egg Race.

They also provide student identification cards/photos, which are honored with discounts by many Elko merchants. Money generated by their fund-raising efforts has provided a pool table, outside benches on campus, a marquee for college announcements, donations to the new Events Center, financial assistance for the student newspaper, as well as assistance to various campus clubs/organizations.

Anyone that has taken 12 credits at GBC is eligible to run for an officer position (President, VP, Secretary, Treasurer). Officer elections are held in the spring semester. Anyone currently enrolled in 6 credits at GBC may run for any of the five Elko Senator positions. There are also three additional Senators - two based on Winnemucca's campus, as well as one on Ely's campus. Most senators are elected the third week of the Fall semester.

Financial rewards are only one advantage of holding an ASB office. The President receives a stipend of \$500 per semester, VP receives \$400 per semester, Secretary and Treasurer each receive \$300 per semester. All eight Senators receive \$150 per semester. There are certain requirements in order to receive the stipend, such as: keeping a GPA of 2.30, maintaining a specific class load (9 credits for Officers and 6 credits for Senators), serving office hours (ranging from 10 hours per week for the President to 3 hours per week for Senators).

"My door is always open," Van de Ven said. She urges anyone interested in becoming an ASB Officer/Senator, or joining any other clubs/organizations, to contact her in the College Community Center for more information. Or one could contact the ASB at 753-2234.

Officers for 1997-98 are: President Brian Dankowski, Vice President Stacy Monroe, Treasurer Josh Lauderback, and Secretary Melissa Jenkins. Senator information packages will be available September 2 and elections will be held September 23-24, with an ASB Retreat on September 26-27 in Lamoille Canyon.
