




Andrea Craig does chin-ups on station eight at the exercise course, assisted by Sharon Coucham. Par for beginners is two chin-ups, and six for advanced.

INVITATION

Northern Nevada Community College is making it possible for you to participate in an exciting revolutionary trend in higher education. Through the medium of television, it will be possible for you to be exposed to experiences not offered in a traditional on-campus lecture course. These telecourses are of sound instructional design and high academic integrity. An integrated learning system—a text, study guide, and series of video cassettes combine to guide students through a successful learning experience. Ideally suited to a rural community, telecourses make it possible to offer a wide variety of college-level courses at off-campus centers. The "independent study" nature of the telecourses accommodates the part-time student whose work schedule might not otherwise allow him/her to pursue a higher education. We hope you will find an NWCC telecourse to fill your educational needs; it can be a very successful and rewarding experience.



GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

Credits earned in a telecourse are transferable to most colleges and universities and many fulfill graduation requirements for NWCC programs. Telecourses which satisfy specific Associate in Arts degree requirements are: ENG 101, ENG 102, BIOL 101, ECON 101, PSY 101, SOC 101, CD 102, ENG 241, ENG 271, and HUM 100. Others may be used to fulfill the electives requirement. Telecourses which satisfy Associate in Applied Science degree requirements are: same as above except MATH 100D and MATH 101D will satisfy certain programs. Telecourses which satisfy Associate degree in Nursing requirements are: ENG 102, CD 102, PSY 101, and SOC 101.

ROTATION SCHEDULE

Telecourses are offered in Elko, Ely, Eureka, Battle Mountain, and Winnemucca on a rotating schedule. Check at the Learning Resources Center or with your center coordinator to see when certain courses will be offered in your area.

COURSE DESCRIPTIONS



AST 101, General Astronomy: "Cosmos" - Aboard a specially-designed "spaceship of the imagination," Carl Sagan will take students on a ten billion light-year journey from the far reaches of the universe to the earth. The series will cover cosmic catastrophes, travel to the stars, cosmic influences on evolution, the collisions of continents, the origin of life, contact with other civilizations, the birth and death of stars and galaxies, the future of the earth, and the origin and fate of the universe. 13 one-hour video cassettes. 3 units.



BIOL 101, General Biology - Designed as an introductory, non-laboratory course to fulfill general education requirements of non-major students, this award-winning telecourse focuses on the viewer—the human—by developing an appreciation of the intricate human body. How it functions as a whole is stressed. The living world of animals and plants around the viewer is related to human existence so as to help the student realize the unity of all life forms. The course also presents the role of man in the total ecology of the planet. 36 half-hour video cassettes. 3 units.



BUS 101, Introduction to Business: "It's Everybody's Business" - This survey of business operations in our contemporary society utilizes interviews with business leaders and the latest business theories to introduce the student to every aspect of today's business—from Wall Street to the truck yard—from the assembly line to the computer center. It concentrates on the accountability of the business enterprise—to the public, to the owners, and to the employees. The management of resources through organization, financing, production and marketing is discussed. 30 half-hour video cassettes. 3 units.



CAPS 123, Career Planning: "Voyage" - Career/life planning involves challenge and change. This telecourse focuses on the process by which you may plan effective and satisfying relationships of work and life. Among vital topics addressed in the course are: self-assessment, dealing with change, decision-making, people environments, life-style balance, values and career decisions, finding jobs and setting goals. 30 half-hour video cassettes. 3 units.



CD 102, Human Growth and Development: "The Growing Years" - The course covers the world of the child from infancy through adolescence. The interplay of biological factors, individual personality, social structure, and other environmental forces in shaping the growing child are the principal themes. Major philosophical approaches to studying children are also investigated. 30 45-minute video cassettes. 3 units.



ECON 101, Introduction to Macroeconomics - This course is an introduction to the study of the determination of levels of national income, employment and prices, and the basic causes of the fluctuations of these levels. The course will help students understand basic economic problems and increase his ability to evaluate rationally policy solutions to economic problems. 30 45-minute video cassettes. 3 units.



ENG 101, Composition and Rhetoric I: "Writing for a Reason" - The telecourse focuses on the

basic writing skills needed for writing in college and in most entry level careers. In addition to preparing students to think more logically and clearly, the course also covers the way language functions historically, socially, and psychologically. 30 half-hour video cassettes. 3 units.

ENG 102, Composition and Rhetoric II: "Communication Through Literature" - Dramatized segments and concrete examples from the works of many writers in many periods bring literature to life. Poetry, drama, fiction, the essay and film are explored. The telecourse stresses the art of writing literature and the skill of writing about literature. 30 half-hour video cassettes. 3 units.



ENG 241, Introduction to the Short Story: "The American Short Story" - This course is based on the PBS short story series. It provides students with an opportunity to read several representative American short stories and to enrich that reading by viewing excellent television versions of those stories. The stories were selected for their literary merit, entertainment potential, and psychological and social insight. The course assignments are designed so that students may use these stories to find meaning in their own lives. 13 one-hour video cassettes. 3 units.



ENG 271, Introduction to Shakespeare - The unique feature and advantage of the course is that students will be able to view professional, BBC television productions of each of the plays studied in the course. Staging, plot, characterization, and the use of language in Shakespeare's plays are discussed within the context of particular plays. 36 one-hour video cassettes. 3 units.


HUM 101, Introduction to the Humanities:

"Humanities Through the Arts" - This is an introductory course that focuses on the humanities and the fine arts. The relation of the humanities to values—objects and events important to mankind—is emphasized. Artists, through the various forms listed below, reveal values; humanists reflect on values. The course will introduce seven major art forms: film, drama, music, literature, painting, sculpture, and architecture. 30 half-hour video cassettes. 3 units.

HUM 230, Ascent of Man - This course covers the history of scientific humanistic thought from the Stone Age to Modern Times. Intriguing titles such as: "Lower than Angels," "Majestic Clockwork," and "Grain in the Stone," promise the student a very interesting experience. 13 one-hour video cassettes. 3 units.



PSY 101, General Psychology: "Understanding Human Behavior" - This basic psychology course encourages an understanding and appreciation of the scientific approach to the study of human behavior. The course integrates the physiological, intrapsychic and social behavioral perspectives on human thought and behavior. Some areas investigated include: the brain, sexual motivation, stress, phobias, memory, genetic psychology and acupuncture. 30 half-hour video cassettes. 3 units.



MATH 100D*, Basic Math - This developmental course has been video-taped in an actual classroom setting at NNCC. The fundamental operations of whole numbers, fractions and mixed numbers, decimals, percentage, and measurements are topics covered in the course. It is intended to provide a review of basics needed in future mathematics courses and in applied fields. 37 one-hour video cassettes. 3 units.

MATH 101D*, Elementary Algebra - The developmental algebra course has also been video-taped in an actual classroom setting at NNCC. It covers the fundamental operations of natural numbers, integers, first degree equations and inequalities in one variable, products and factors, fractions and fractional equations, graphs and linear systems, work problems, radicals and quadratic equations. The course is intended to provide a basic foundation for future mathematics needed in fields of business, economics, engineering and related fields. 37 one-hour video cassettes. 3 units.



SOC 101, Principles of Sociology: "Focus on Society" - Students explore the intersection of history and biography in our society where the social conditions of the present relate to the recent past. Elements of American society—the home, the family, the workplace, marriage, recreation, and even religion—are undergoing significant social change. This telecourse strives to help students better understand what is happening in society and in their own lives. 30 half-hour cassettes. 3 units.

To be admitted to the Associate Degree Program, an applicant must be a high school graduate or equivalent.



The Scope of the Diesel Mechanic

The diesel and heavy-duty mechanic repairs and maintains equipment such as buses, trucks, construction and industrial equipment. The diesel mechanic utilizes hand and power tools. The diesel mechanic diagnoses troubles, disassembles engines and examines parts for defects and excessive wear.

The diesel mechanic maintains and repairs transmissions, drive lines, U-joints, final drives, brakes, frames, and running gears. The mechanic also maintains lifting units, having a complete understanding of mechanical levers and fluid power.

The mechanic is able to troubleshoot and repair electrical systems using proper testing equipment and tools. Welding broken parts, frames and undercarriages is also a part of the diesel mechanics job.





GENERAL INFORMATION

Northern Nevada Community College is a two-year public institution. The college offers programs leading to degrees in Associate in Arts, Associate in Applied Science, Associate in General Studies, and one-year certificates in occupational programs.

NNCC is one of four community colleges in Nevada. The college strives to provide quality post-secondary education for all interested students, regardless of their sex or race.

General education offered at NNCC is intended to prepare the student for adult life, as a family member and consumer, and as a citizen of the community, state, and nation. The general education courses are useful for every student, regardless of whether he plans to complete his schooling with a one- or two-year career program or intends to transfer to a four-year college or university.

The community college is committed to an open-door policy of admission. This applies to admission to the college, but does not insure admission to the School of Nursing.

SCHOOL OF NURSING

The School of Nursing offers a combined program leading to Licensed Practical Nurse certification and an Associate in Applied Science Degree in Nursing.

The curriculum combines courses in nursing with general education requirements. Laboratory and clinical experience is offered at the college, in the hospital, nursing home, and other community health facilities.

The nursing curriculum is based on the career-ladder concept. Such a program allows the student upward mobility for professional advancement and continuing education. Progression from the practical nursing level to the Associate Degree program is not guaranteed to the first-year applicants. Enrollment in both programs is limited. Acceptance is based upon qualifications and meeting the admission requirements. One class per year will be admitted to each program.

Practical Nursing Program

1. Evidence of high school graduation or GED certification.
2. Application for NNCC.
3. Application for School of Nursing.
4. Pre-nursing exam given by Student Services, March 22, 1984 @ 1:00 p.m.
5. Personal interview with Selection Committee, which includes a Nursing Advisory Committee member.

Associate Degree Program

1. Current license to practice as an LPN in Nevada or eligible to take State Board exam.
2. Nursing education from an accredited college or school. Minimum acceptable grade for any nursing course is "C" (2.0). Courses from other schools will be reviewed and accepted on an individual basis.
3. General Education Requirements:
 - English 101
 - General Psychology 101







Mechanical Technology Training Program at Northern Nevada Community College

Purpose

The Mechanical Technology Training Program (MTTP) is a special opportunity for recent high school graduates interested in the mechanical trades. MTTP is an intensive two-year work/study program which combines classroom and laboratory instruction with on-the-job work experience with Northern Nevada mining companies, their suppliers, and equipment vendors. MTTP will permit eligible trainees to acquire valuable education and practical job skills that will lead them directly into a career in the mechanical trades.

The program will start in early June, 1990, and run through May, 1992. Trainees who complete the program will be employed by participating mining companies or vendors. Up to 25 trainees will be accepted into the MTTP program each year. Classroom work will be conducted at Northern Nevada Community College in Elko, a recognized leader in heavy duty diesel training in Nevada, with a twenty year record of training students in the mechanical trades.

Careers in the mechanical trades include diesel technicians, mill mechanics, welding technicians, and heavy equipment maintenance mechanics. Completion of the MTTP program will give graduates employment in a field with a future, a job with good pay and excellent benefits, and job skills which will be invaluable for the rest of their working lives.

Who is eligible?

First priority will be given to students graduating from area high schools each year who have received mechanical training in high school or through part-time work. Older high school graduates will be eligible on an availability basis. Individual interest, mechanical aptitude, and character will be determinants in the selection process. Mechanical training received in part-time work or experience will be considered, but the aptitude of the applicant will be evaluated by testing during the application process.

In addition to mechanical courses, good skills in basic mathematics, computer literacy, reading and writing are required, as the program involves classroom training in addition to hands-on experience. Successful applicants will exhibit a strong work ethic, good attendance and behavioral experience, responsibility and a commitment to a career working in the mechanical trades. The selection committee will be representatives from the programs' sponsors, along with consultants from area high schools and Northern Nevada Community College.

Why should you consider the MTTP Program?

Tuition and a weekly stipend is paid to successful applicants during the NNCC portions of the program. This stipend can be used for living expenses and the purchase of tools needed during their future career in the mechanical trades.

During the first summer the participants are employed at a variety of the operations participating in the program. During the classroom training the participants receive their weekly stipend. During the second year work/study part of the program the participants are paid wages during their periods on the job, and receive a stipend while they are in class. During the second year, participants must determine a field of specialization, after which classroom and on-the-job experiences will be focussed on that area.

Upon completion of the program, students will be offered employment in their field of training, most likely with the participating sponsor of their on-the-job training over the second year.

The completed application form must be accompanied by a copy of the student's most recent high school transcript, attendance record, and health records. These forms must be received at NNCC no later than March 12, 1990.

Applicants should be prepared to attend an interview, and to complete aptitude testing to be conducted at NNCC. A complete physical examination will be required of all successful applicants, which includes a screen for drugs and alcohol. Federal Law requires that workers employed at a mine-site must be 18 years old. Applicants must provide proof that they will be 18 years old no later than August 1 of the year of their graduation. Final acceptance into the program is contingent upon graduation with their regular class.

How does the program work?

During early June, successful applicants will meet at Northern Nevada Community College for safety training and orientation into the program. During the summer, participants will be employed as "bull gang" laborers at each of three of the participating sponsors, working about a month at each site. Participants will be expected to conform to the work rules of the various job-sites, and will be paid at the existing basic laborer rates during their employment.

From September through mid-November, trainees will study at Northern Nevada Community College in Elko. Technical mathematics, communications, hydraulics, basic electricity, and laboratory instruction in basic shop skills and welding will be featured. Trainees will then return to a work site for six weeks, until January, working as laborers in a maintenance group. Afterwards trainees will study at NNCC one week in every four, taking concentrated classes in Rigging, Lubrication, Work Ethics, Blueprint Reading, Welding, and Advanced Hydraulics.

During the summer of the second year, trainees will be employed at a job site as laborers with the maintenance group. By the Fall of the second year, each trainee will begin to specialize, deciding between employment with a participating mine or vendor-supplier-equipment company as openings permit. If a mine position is selected, then the trainee must choose between specializing in mill or mine maintenance. Once the selection is made, a trainee will be assigned to a specific sponsor who will provide employment during the work portion of the program, and offer full-time employment in the area of specialization upon completion of the program.

During this second year employment will be as a mechanic's helper, with one week in every four spent in classes at NNCC studying the following:





Mechanical Technology Training Program At Northern Nevada Community College

What is MTTP?

The Mechanical Technology Training Program (MTTP) is a special career opportunity for high school graduates interested in mechanical technology.

MTTP is an intensive one-year, three-semester program which combines classroom and laboratory instruction at Northern Nevada Community College. Paid on-the-job work experience is possible with Nevada mining companies, their suppliers, and equipment vendors during the summer and semester break.

Careers in mechanical technology include diesel technicians, mill mechanics, welding technicians, and industrial maintenance electricians. Completion of MTTP will qualify graduates for employment in a field with a future, a job with good pay and excellent benefits, and job skills useful for the rest of their lives.

Manpower Training Cooperative, Inc. (MTC), is a group of companies that sponsors MTTP and currently includes Newmont Gold, Barrick-Goldstrike, Dee Gold, Pioneer Equipment, The Miner's Pick, and Round Mountain Gold. Northern Nevada Community College in Elko is a member of the University and Community College System of Nevada and a fully-accredited institution.

Why Consider MTTP?

A \$3,000 scholarship is paid to successful applicants during the NNCC 40-week program. This scholarship pays for tuition, fees and some books.

During the work periods, participants are paid the regular wage of an entry level laborer.

Upon successful completion of the program, students will be prepared for employment in their field of training.

In short, MTTP provides up-to-date training at NNCC, that prepares students for employment in the mining industry and by other industry-related employers.

Who Fits Into MTTP?

A solid high school record is essential for successful applicants, including good attendance and creditable grades. Evidence of mechanical aptitude, good character, strong work ethic, and a genuine interest in mechanical technology as a career are strong considerations in selecting students for MTTP. Because this is a college program, successful applicants need to have good mathematical, reading, and writing skills.

Applicants should be prepared to attend an interview and to complete aptitude testing to be conducted at NNCC. A complete physical examination will be required of all successful applicants, including a screen for drugs and alcohol. Federal law requires that workers employed at a mine-site must be 18 years old. Applicants must provide proof that they will be 18 years old no later than June 1 of the year of their graduation. Final acceptance into the program is contingent upon graduation with their regular class.

How Does the Program Work?

During early June, successful applicants may meet at Northern Nevada Community College for safety training and orientation. During the summer, some participants may be employed as laborers at two or three of the participating sponsors. Participants will be expected to conform to the work rules of the various job-sites and will be paid at the existing basic laborer rates.

From September through December, trainees will study at Northern Nevada Community College in Elko. Technical mathematics, communication, hydraulics, basic electricity, shop skills and welding will be featured. For the remainder of the program, trainees will spend two semesters (one, 15-week and one, 10-week summer semester) in their major field of study.

MILL MECHANICS

Great Basin College mill mechanics have the ability to install, maintain, and repair industrial plant equipment and structures. Students who complete the program are able to troubleshoot and repair bearing-related failures in the industrial plant. They have the ability to work on conveyors, crushers, and hydraulic equipment. The Great Basin mill mechanics program is widely acclaimed as an example of excellence in education.

WELDING TECHNOLOGY

Welding technology at Great Basin College provides state-of-the-art instruction in all types of welding with acetylene, MIG, and TIG, including welding aluminum, stainless steel, mild steel, and titanium. 

Introduction



The CHILD CENTER provides a preschool program for 3 to 6 year old children. It is designed to serve three groups: children, their families, and college students enrolled in child development classes, and nursing courses.

The aim of the Center is to offer a well-rounded experience for all three groups. For the children, the Center provides experiences and activities that will promote the development of the WHOLE CHILD in areas of social, emotional, intellectual, physical, moral and creative growth. The Center also aims to work in partnership with the parents of the children to coordinate learning experiences and guidance techniques between home and school, and to provide a program of support and involvement for parents. Finally, the Center offers college students the opportunity to observe children, work with both children and parents, and learn to be competent preschool teachers.

Philosophy and Purpose

The preschool program is designed to provide a variety of experiences for young children. There is a balance of structured and unstructured activities and of individual, small group, and large group experiences. Observation and assessment of each child allows for individualization to meet the needs of all children. Daily and long-term developmental goals are planned in this way.

The preschool curriculum includes activities in the following areas:

- creative arts
- science
- pre-math
- reading readiness
- language
- music and movement
- dramatic play
- self-help skills
- blocks
- woodworking
- cooking

Examples of experiences the children may have include the following:



--seeing how air moves under a parachute

--going on field trips to a dentist's office, a farm, the mountains

--learning how to share with new-found friends

--discovering different cultures and languages

--discovering red paint and yellow paint turn orange

--learning how to care for classroom plants and pets

--finding that "there's no one exactly like ME"

--learning to recognize my name



Payment for both the morning and afternoon programs can be made in three equal installments. The first payment is due at time of registration, the second during the fifth week of the semester, and the last during the tenth week.

Cash, or a check (made out to NNCC) for the exact amount should be given to your child's teacher on the date due.



Enrollment for the morning and afternoon programs for Fall and Spring semesters will be on a first-come, first-served basis.

Beginning and ending dates for the Fall and Spring semesters coincide approximately with the college schedule.

The Child Center observes the same holidays as the public schools.

The Child Center asks parents to abide by some simple rules which make running of the program easier for the staff, the children, and parents.

1. For the sake of safety, bring your child directly into his/her classroom through the small glass door to the right of the locked playyard. Help your child take his coat off and hang it in his cubbie, put his name tag on and then when you leave please go through the Observation Room.
2. When picking your child up after Pre-School please enter through the Observation Room and watch there until you are given a sign from the teacher to enter the classroom. At that time your child will be dismissed from the Circle to you. The two of you may go to his cubbie, leave his nametag, pick up his belongings, and leave through the small glass door. A child will not be allowed to leave with anyone other than those persons authorized (by parent's signature) to pick up the child.
3. Daily a "Today We..." sign will be posted on the Observation Room door. This will tell you what took place in the Pre-School on that particular day.
4. We are required by state licensing regulations to have an annual doctor-signed, or public health nurse verification of each child's health. Forms, provided at registration, need to be in our files within two weeks of the beginning of each term. Immunization records need to be current.
5. A sick child should not be at school. If a child is too sick to play outdoors, he/she is too sick to be at school.
6. Children should be appropriately dressed for the weather. Boots are needed when there is snow on the ground. Jackets, mittens, and hats are necessary in cold weather. Unless it is raining or snowing, children play outside every day.
7. Clearly mark jackets, boots, mittens, hats, etc. with the child's name. Such items are easily lost and hard to identify.
8. Children who are in the Center at noon must bring a lunch. Lunch boxes or sacks should be clearly marked with the child's name.
9. It is easier for both your child and his classmates if no toys from home come to school, since these are easily lost or broken. Designated "sharing" times will be announced by teachers, and children can then bring favorite items to share.
10. Please do not leave your child at the Center earlier than ten minutes before the time he is enrolled. Also, children need to be picked up at the designated time or a late fee will be assessed.
11. Children are enrolled in the program on a semesterly basis. The only time refunds are issued is when a child is withdrawn from the program or changes are made in schedule.






Keys to Success . . .

Many NNCC courses require a student to have either obtained a specific score on the assessment exam or have taken a pre-requisite class. Students entering NNCC who have not taken the national ACT or SAT tests are encouraged to take the assessment test prior to seeing their counselor or faculty advisor.

NNCC counselors also conduct orientations at the beginning of each semester to enhance student success.
