

NNCC registration continues today

First day of registration for fall semester classes at Northern Nevada Community College showed a slight drop from the first day of registration last year, according to NNCC acting dean of student services Stan Alazzi.

Registration continues until 7 tonight. He added that registration can also be completed from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. tomorrow and from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. each weekday next week except for Wednesday, when the college will

remain open until 9 p.m.

Alazzi said 373 people registered yesterday for regular classes and additional 53 registered for community service classes.

Last year 478 registered on the day for regular classes and 40 community service.

Alazzi added, however, that it appeared there were more full-time students registering than in previous years, which he said was an encouraging sign.

The college receives funds from state based on the number of full-time equivalent students. Alazzi said FTE figures would not be available until sometime after the close of registration next week.

Alazzi said a full selection of classes is being offered this semester. "This is one of the most complete and varied schedules we have ever had at the college."

He noted that all full-time faculty and some part-time instructors are at the college during registration to counsel new students and to provide information about courses.

In addition, financial aid personnel are present to process applicants for grants, loans, work study and veterans' programs.

Some room is still available in campus housing units, and residential managers Bernice and Dick Cullen will answer questions and receive applications for the housing.

"We'll be here until 7 tonight and all day tomorrow for those who want to register," he concluded.

Registration for fall semester classes at Northern Nevada Community College will be held from 8 a.m. to 9 p.m. on Wednesday, Aug. 29, and from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. on Thursday, Aug. 30, according to college president Dr. Bill Berg.

He said the college is again offering a full range of classes in liberal arts, computers, science and math, agriculture and vocational-technical subjects.

Classes start the week of Sept. 4.

All instructors will be on campus on Monday, Aug. 27, from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. to meet with new and returning students and to answer inquiries

about the classes, said Berg. He said it's a great opportunity for new students to find out about graduation requirements, degrees and transfer of credits.

A tabloid publication containing descriptions of most classes and a schedule for the fall semester is available by contacting the student services office at the college.

Berg noted that features in the fall schedule include:

— Geotechnical program, which trains students for entry level jobs in several mining occupations, including assaying, drafting and surveying, and geology.

— An expanded number of math and science class offer-

ings.

— An expanded number of computer classes.

— Several community service classes designed to meet local needs, including a one-day teleconference on improving the downtown and a two-day seminar about teenage suicide.

Fees are generally \$20 per semester credit with a one-time application fee of \$5 for new students. In addition, some classes require lab fee.

Financial aid is available for students, and information about work-study and other programs of grants and loans will be available from financial aids officer Joan Nivens during registration.

Berg added that some room remains available in the college's housing units. Rent is \$235 monthly for the furnished units with all utilities paid. There is also a damage and cleaning deposit of \$200.

Final registration for the fall semester for local Northern Nevada Community College classes is scheduled for Thursday from 2:30 p.m. until 8 p.m. at the White Pine County Library.

Representatives from the college will be available to counsel students on curriculum, benefits and grants available. Courses begin the week of September 10th.

Some of the scheduled class offerings are:

'Business Law': Ed Irvin, the instructor, says "To all individuals who are not attorneys, avoidance of the courtroom is the key to legal success. This is accomplished by knowledgeable preventative actions preceding a conflict. The class "Business Law" will deal with the major areas of law, other than criminal. It will be informative to businessmen and consumers for part of the semester, and everyday concerns, such as wills, property, and accidents for the remainder. The class will not produce lawyers, but might avoid some of the need for them," NNCC off campus coordinator Judi Rick said.

'Small Business Management': This class is being taught by David Drips. Its objectives are to give the student an appreciation of small business in our economy. To give an understanding of how to organize and operate a small business, To offer practice in making decisions under conditions of uncertainty and incomplete facts, and to understand that making money in small business can be fun and easy. Small Business Management classes will be held on Thursdays from 7-10 p.m.

'Applied Economics': David Drips is also teaching this class. This course is the introduction to the concepts of the time value of money and its applications to the evaluation of investment situations. The course presents the development and application of evaluation techniques used in comparing investment alternatives. Applied Economics classes will meet on Tuesdays from 7-10 p.m.

'Conversational Spanish, Intermediate Level' This is an intermediate course in Spanish taught by Mary Rhea, a native English speaker who learned and spoke Spanish during a three-year stay in Ecuador. This class is designed as a follow-up to beginning Spanish conversation or for people with some knowledge of Spanish. Emphasis will be on speaking. There will be no text-books, but a dictionary is recommended. Past, future and subjunctive tense will be taught as well as expanding present tense and vocabulary.

'General Psychology': George Doherty, the instructor of this course, says the major goal is for the student to learn the basic facts and ideas of psychology and to learn how to apply these in their own lives. Two additional goals are: (1) To introduce the student to the broad range of modern psychology in an interesting fashion and; (2) To foster the student's self-understanding. General Psychology will be held on Wednesday nights from 7-10 p.m.

'English 117D Writing Workshop': Ellie Dickinson will be teaching this writing workshop. The class emphasizes techniques for writing sentences and paragraphs. The course also includes an extensive review of grammar, punctuation and usage. To aid the student in developing vocabulary and thinking skills, the class includes a variety of short prose readings. English 117D is intended for those who need more work in writing before enrolling in college-level English and for those who wish to improve writing skills on their jobs. The day for this class will be determined at the first Wednesday night session...Sept. 12, 1984. The time for both English classes being offered this semester is from 6-9 p.m.

Several Community Service classes are also being offered this semester: Beginning Photography, Beginning Cake Decorating, Beginning Calligraphy, and Advanced Calligraphy.

Registration for a wide variety of classes in the fall alternate semester at Northern Nevada Community College will be held Thursday and Friday, Oct. 11-12, announces college president Dr. Bill Berg.

✓ Technical drafting and drawing classes on Tuesday and Thursday nights.

✓ A seminar on building codes, designed for engineers, contractors and others who want to learn about changes in the building codes, to be offered Nov. 14.

✓ Several music offerings, including participation in College Singers and the Community Orchestra. College Singers, under the direction of Ken Brooks, meets at 7 p.m. Wednesdays and will be performing Handel's "Messiah" as their masterwork at a concert at the Elko Civil Auditorium on Dec. 9.

Community Orchestra, under the direction of Jo Anne Stoddard, will

meet on Tuesday evenings and perform one concert each semester.

✓ Real estate workshop in federal taxation of real estate transactions Oct. 19-20.



NNCC ENROLLMENT



About the same number of students are enrolled in Northern Nevada Community College this fall as there were last fall, but they are taking fewer credit hours this year. That resulted in an average six percent drop in full-time equivalent enrollment, with most of the decline occurring at the main Elko campus. The slight reduction in overall enrollment followed an increase during the last summer session.

College enrollment levels off

Enrollment at Northern Nevada Community College declined slightly this fall after about 10 years of steady increases, and state education officials said enrollment here is expected to level off over the next few years.

Figures released last week by the University of Nevada System show 1,480 students (not counting adult education and community service classes) enrolled at NNCC as of Oct. 15, compared to 1,489 students at the same time last year.

But the number of credit hours taken by those students declined by a wider margin, dropping from the equivalent of 427 full-time students in the fall of 1983 to 401 students this fall.

NNCC Dean of Instruction Charles Greenhaw explained that funding for each school is based on the "full-time equivalent" figures, which are calculated by dividing the total number of credit hours by 15.

The fall count represents a decline of about six percent in total enrollment compared to last year. The nursing program at NNCC increased in size from 17 to 21 students this fall...but enrollment in regular classes dropped about nine percent and rural classes dropped three percent (see chart).

"Most of the decline was at Elko," Greenhaw explained, where the number of full-time units dropped by 28. He

said half of that decrease was experienced in the Elko High School early studies program, where fewer students are participating in NNCC classes.

Greenhaw said enrollment at NNCC had been steadily increasing for the past 10 years or so.

"But there are fewer younger people going to college now," he explained, a trend reflected in other schools both throughout the state and across the country.

And Greenhaw said the college's growth is limited by its limited resources.

"You shouldn't expect unlimited growth if you're resources don't grow — if you don't have the physical space and you don't have the teachers."

He pointed out that departments such as nursing, automotive and diesel technology have been filled to capacity.

As a result of the leveling off in student enrollment, Greenhaw said the school has no plans to increase its overall staff size within the next two years.

In presenting the statewide enrollment figures to the Nevada Board of Regents last week, vice chancellors Warren Fox and Ron Sparks of the University of Nevada System said they indicate Nevada's higher education student population may be

shifting from the traditional young, full-time student to an older, part-time student.

They noted enrollment statewide was down only slightly compared to last year — dropping from 44,068 to 43,409 — but those students who are enrolled are taking fewer credits.

That resulted in a 2.25 percent decline in full-time equivalent enrollment statewide.

"When the economy improves and jobs are available, fewer people go to school," Fox said. "Nationally, the only student population that has increased this year is the older, part-time student."

Sparks said because fall enrollments were below projections, the university system has trimmed its original budget request for the 1985-87 biennium.

By hiring fewer teachers than planned, "We'll reduce our base budget state general fund request the first year by \$1,066,284 and by \$1,151,871 the second year," he said.

The new budget does assume slight enrollment growth on each campus in the next two years, he added.

But NNCC is at the bottom of the projected growth list, with enrollment here expected to stay practically the same as it stands now.

Berg will greet the class and visitors and introduce the commencement speaker. Academic Dean Charles Greenhaw will announce the Founders and Community Service Awards.

NNCC spring semester registration tomorrow

Dr. Jerrold Ottley, director of the Mormon Tabernacle Choir, will present a choral directing workshop for music teachers and choral directors on Saturday, Feb. 23, announces Charles Greenhaw, dean of instruction at Northern Nevada Community Col-

Northern Nevada Community College has scheduled its second registration Jan. 21, between 2:30 and 7:30 p.m., at the White Pine County Library.

Among new classes offered are: Great Basin Indian Tradition, with emphasis on the Shoshone traditions and basic conversational language; physical geology and a geology lab for local rock and mineral identification; a basic ore deposits class; beginning and advanced calligraphy, which teaches basic italic, celtic and old English, through perfecting techniques of copper plate and paper embossment; European civilization; criminal justice; Spanish II and III; community band, learning to prepare music with a performance scheduled in the spring; beginning cross-country skiing; psychology courses dealing with both domestic violence and being a parent; and basic chemistry.

Classes range from one to three credits, with credits costing \$20 each.

Also offered is a workshop titled "A Matter of Life and Breadth," which offers information on controlling weight through proper nutrition.







"Mining companies must now train their own people at a great expense because there is no source" of people trained in drafting, surveying, computer programming, sampling procedures, assaying methods, and basic geology.

The geotechnical science program will provide instruction in all those areas, said McFarlane.

Support for starting the program came from several area mines and from the education committee of the Nevada Mining Assn.

Geotechnicians who

complete the college course will be "very attractive" to the mines and will likely find employment with geologists and mining engineers in the exploration, development and mining fields of the mineral industry, said McFarlane.

The program will also enable the geotechnicians to work with surveyors, draftsmen, assayers and drillers on an individual basis.


McFarlane noted that the program is consistent with the college's mission of "a strong commitment of service" to the industries and services

within the college's five-county service area.

Berg noted that no new personnel will be hired because of the program. Along with McFarlane, instruction will be provided by area mining and geological professionals available part-time instruction.



